■ About the battery pack

Battery charger

This battery charger operates on AC between 110 V and 240 V.

But

- In the U.S.A. and Canada, the battery charger must be connected to a 120 V AC power supply only.
- When connecting to an AC supply outside of the U.S.A. or Canada, use a plug adaptor to suit the AC outlet configuration.
- When connecting to a supply of greater than AC 125V, ensure the cord you use is suited to the voltage of the AC supply and the rated current of the battery charger.
- Contact an electrical parts distributor for assistance in selecting a suitable AC plug adaptor or AC cord set.

■ Care of the camera

- **Do not strongly shake or bump the camera by dropping it etc.**

This unit may malfunction, recording pictures may no longer be possible or the lens or the LCD monitor may be damaged.

- **Be particularly careful in the following places as they may cause this unit to malfunction.**

- Places with a lot of sand or dust.
- Places where water can come into contact with this unit such as when using it on a rainy day or on a beach.

- **This unit is not waterproof. If rain water or other drops of water splash onto the camera, wipe it with a dry cloth.**

- **Do not put your hands inside the mirror.** Do not press, push or use a blower brush to forcefully blow air on the shutter curtains as they are very thin. Be careful as they may get scratched, bent or damaged.

■ About Condensation (When the lens is fogged up)

- Condensation occurs when the ambient temperature or humidity changes. Be careful of condensation since it causes lens stains, fungus and camera malfunction.
- If condensation occurs, turn the camera off and leave it for about 2 hours. The fog will disappear naturally when the temperature of the camera becomes close to the ambient temperature.

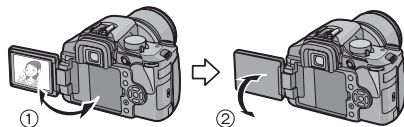
Rotating the LCD monitor

At the time when this camera is purchased, the LCD monitor is set inside the frame of the camera body. Move the LCD monitor in the directions shown in the figure below.



- 1 Open the LCD monitor opening knob (A) with your finger.
- 2 It can be rotated 180° forwards.
 - It can only be rotated 90° towards you.
- 3 Return the monitor to its original position.
 - Refer to the following for details on how to rotate the LCD monitor.

About the Lens

You can use the supplied lens or a lens that is compatible with the lens mount standard for the “Four Thirds System (Four Thirds Mount)” with this unit.

Select a lens that matches the scene being recorded and your use of the pictures.

If you use a lens other than a dedicated interchangeable lens, auto focus cannot be activated and accurate metering is not possible. Also, some functions will not work.

■ “Four Thirds Mount”



This is the lens mount standard for the “Four Thirds System”.

These are interchangeable lenses newly developed specifically for the optical design requirements of digital cameras.

■ Using a lens other than the supplied lens

- Depending on the type of lens, you may not be able to use some functions such as contrast AF (P58), the direction detection function (P35) and OIS mode (P96).
- The available flash range etc. differs depending on the aperture value of the lens you are using.
- Take some test pictures with the lens you are using.
- The camera automatically switches to phase difference AF [] (P59) if you use a lens that does not support contrast AF (P58) even if [LIVE VIEW AF] (P107) in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu is set to [] (P58). Check the following for compatible lenses.

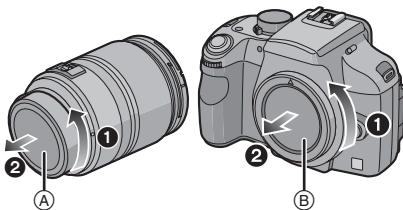

Attaching/Detaching the Lens

- Check that the camera is turned off.
- Close the flash.

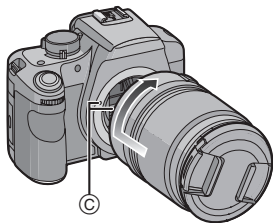
■ Attaching a lens to the camera body

1 Turn the lens rear cap (A) and the body cap (B) in the direction of the arrow to detach them.



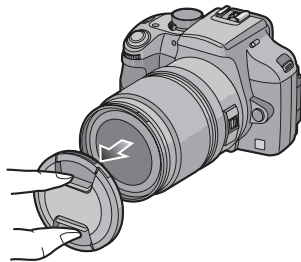
- Do not put your hands inside the mirror.

2 Align the lens fitting marks (C) (red marks) on the camera body and the lens and then rotate the lens in the direction of the arrow until it clicks.



- Do not press the lens release button when you attach a lens.
- Do not try to attach the lens when holding it at an angle to the camera body as the lens mount may get scratched.
- Check that the lens is attached correctly.

3 Detach the lens cap.

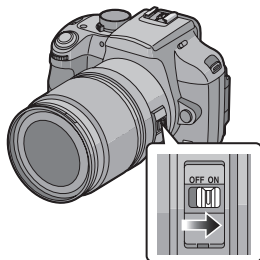


■ Optical image stabilizer

The supplied lens has an optical image stabilizer function.

The optical image stabilizer function is set for activation when the lens is attached to the camera body.

Set the [O.I.S.] switch to [ON].



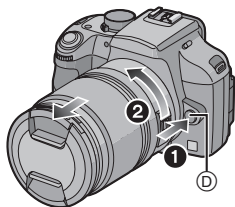
- You can change the optical image stabilizer mode to [MODE1], [MODE2] or [MODE3] using [OIS MODE] in the [REC] mode menu. (P96) It is set to [MODE1] at the time of purchase.
- We recommend setting the [O.I.S.] switch to [OFF] when using a tripod. If the [O.I.S.] switch is set to [OFF], [OFF] is displayed on the LCD monitor.

■ Detaching a lens from the camera body

- Check that the camera is turned off.

1 Attach the lens cap.

2 Press the lens release button D while turning the lens as far as possible in the direction of the arrow to detach it.



- Always attach the body cap to the camera body so that dirt or dust does not get inside.
- Attach the lens rear cap so that the lens contact point does not get scratched.



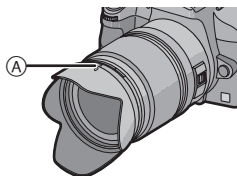
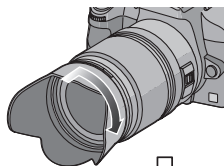
- Change lenses where there is not a lot of dirt or dust.
- When you turn the camera off or carry the camera, attach the lens cap to protect the surface of the lens.
- Detach the lens cap before taking pictures.
- **Be careful not to lose the lens cap, the lens rear cap and the body cap.**

Attaching the Lens Hood

In bright sunlight or backlight, the lens hood will minimize lens flare and ghosting. The lens hood cuts off excess lighting and improves the picture quality.

- Check that the camera is turned off.
- Close the flash.

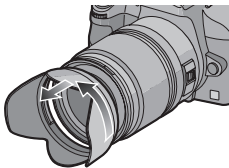
Insert the lens hood on the lens with the short sides at the top and bottom and then turn it in the direction of the arrow until it clicks.



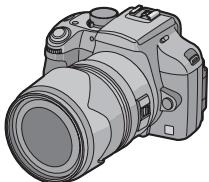
- A Fit to the mark.

■ Temporarily storing the lens hood

1 Turn the lens hood in the direction of the arrow to detach it.



2 Reverse the lens hood and then attach it in the same way as shown previously.



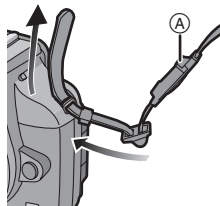
- Attach the lens cap.
- When temporarily storing the lens hood, check that it is firmly attached and that it does not appear in the picture.



- Hold the short sides of the lens hood when attaching or detaching it.
- When taking pictures with the flash with the lens hood attached, the lower portion of the screen may turn dark (vignetting effect) and the control of the flash may be disabled because the photo flash may be obscured by the lens hood. We recommend detaching the lens hood.
- When using the AF assist lamp in the dark, detach the lens hood.
- For details on how to attach the MC protector and the PL filter, refer to P126.

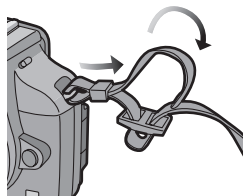
Attaching the Strap

1 Pass the strap through the strap eyelet on the camera body.

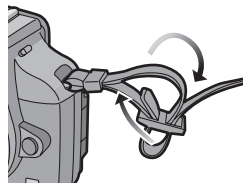


- Ⓐ Eyepiece cap
- Attach the strap so that the side with the eyepiece cap attached to it is near the Viewfinder.

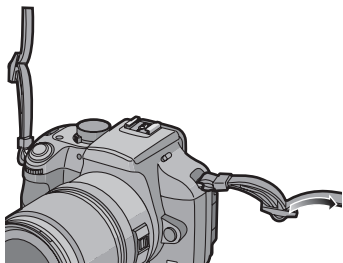
2 Pass the end of the strap through the ring in the direction of the arrow and then pass it through the stopper.



3 Pass the end of the strap through the hole on the other side of the stopper.



- 4 Pull the other side of the strap and then check that it will not come out.**



- Perform steps **1** to **4** and then attach the other side of the strap.



- Be sure to follow the steps and attach the strap correctly.
- Check that the strap is firmly attached to the camera.
- Attach the strap so that the “LUMIX” LOGO is on the outside.

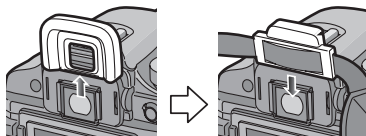
Attaching the Eyepiece Cap

When taking pictures with your eye removed from the Viewfinder, light may enter the Viewfinder and affect the exposure and focus.

Attach the eyepiece cap so that light does not enter the Viewfinder and prevent accurate exposure when taking pictures with Live View (P54) or the Self-timer (P74) and when using the remote shutter (DMW-RSL1; optional) (P127).

■ Attaching the eyepiece cap

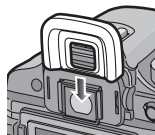
- 1 Slide the eye cup from the bottom to detach it.
- 2 Slide the eyepiece cap from the top.



- The eyepiece cap is attached to the strap.

■ Attaching the eye cup

Slide the eye cup from the top.



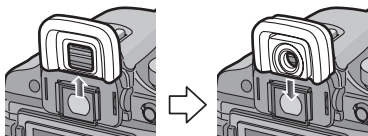
- Be careful not to lose the eye cup.
- Consult the dealer if you lose the eye cup (VYQ4130).
- Keep the eyepiece cap out of reach of children to prevent swallowing.

Attaching the Magnifier Eye Cup

You can magnify the field of view of the Viewfinder by 1.2 times. This makes it easier to fix the focus when taking pictures with manual focus and taking close-up pictures.

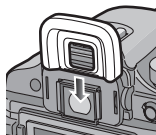
■ Attaching the magnifier eye cup

- ❷ Slide the magnifier eye cup from the top.

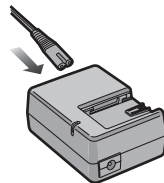

Charging the Battery with the Charger

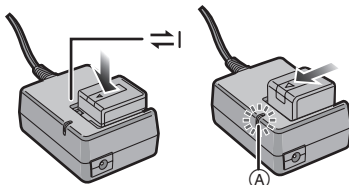
- The battery is not charged when the camera is shipped. Charge the battery before use.

1 Connect the AC cable.



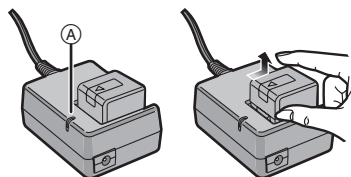
- The battery cannot be charged when the DC cable (DMW-DCC1; optional) is connected to the AC adaptor.

2 Align the battery with the marks on the charger and then place it straight into the charger. Check that it is firmly attached.



- Charging starts when the [CHARGE] indicator (A) lights green.

3 Detach the battery after charging is completed.



- Charging is completed when the [CHARGE] indicator **A** turns off (after about 140 minutes).



- Do not use any other AC cables except the supplied one.
- After charging is completed, be sure to disconnect the AC cable from the electrical outlet.
- The battery becomes warm after using it and during and after charging. The camera also becomes warm during use. This is not a malfunction.
- The battery will be exhausted if left for a long period of time after being charged. Recharge the battery when it is exhausted.
- The battery can be charged even if it is not fully discharged.
- **Use the dedicated charger and battery.**
- **Use the charger indoors.**
- **Do not disassemble or modify the charger.**
- The battery charger is in the standby condition when the AC cable is connected. The primary circuit is always "live" as long as the power cord is connected to an electrical outlet.

About the Battery

(charging/number of recordable pictures)

■ Battery indication

The remaining battery power appears on the screen.



- The battery indication turns red and blinks. (The status indicator blinks when the LCD monitor turns off.) Recharge the battery or replace it with fully charged battery. [This does not appear when using the AC adaptor. (P128)]

■ The battery life

Recording conditions by CIPA standard

- Temperature: 23 °C (73.4 °F)/ Humidity: 50% when LCD monitor is on.*
- Using a Panasonic SD Memory Card (128 MB).
- Using the supplied battery.
- Using the supplied lens.
- Starting recording 30 seconds after the camera is turned on. (When the optical image stabilizer function is set to [MODE1])
- **Recording once every 30 seconds** with full flash every second recording.
- Turn the camera off every 10 recordings.
- * The number of recordable pictures decreases in Auto power LCD mode or Power LCD mode. (P56)
- CIPA is an abbreviation of "Camera & Imaging Products Association".

The number of recordable pictures varies depending on the recording interval time. If the recording interval time becomes longer, the number of recordable pictures decreases. [e.g. When recording once every 2 minutes, the number of recordable pictures decreases to about 120.]

The number of recordable pictures and the playback time will vary depending on the operating conditions of the unit and the storing conditions of the battery.

■ Charging

Charging time	Approx. 140 min

Charging time and number of recordable pictures with the optional battery pack (DMW-BLA13PP) are the same as above.

- The [CHARGE] indicator lights when charging starts.

■ When the [CHARGE] indicator flashes

- The battery is over discharged (discharged excessively). In a while, the [CHARGE] indicator will light up and normal charging will start.
- The battery temperature is excessively high or low. The charging time will be longer than normal. Also, charging may not be completed.
- When the operating time of the camera becomes extremely short even after properly charging the battery, the life of the battery may have expired. Buy a new battery.

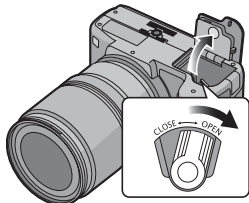
■ Charging conditions

- Charge the battery in a temperature between 10 °C to 35 °C. (50 °F to 95 °F). (The battery temperature should also be the same.)
- The performance of the battery may temporarily deteriorate and the operating time may become shorter in low temperature conditions (e.g. skiing/snowboarding).
- The battery may swell and its operating time may become shorter as the number of times it is charged increases. For long term battery use, we recommend you do not frequently charge the battery before it is exhausted.

Inserting/Removing the Battery

- Check that the camera is turned off.
- Close the flash.

1 Slide the release lever in the direction of the arrow (OPEN side) and then open the battery door.



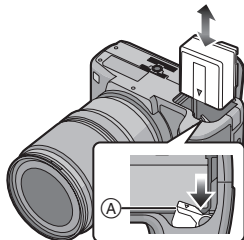
- Always use genuine Panasonic batteries (DMW-BLA13PP).
- If you use other batteries, we cannot guarantee the quality of this product.

2 Insert:

Insert the charged battery fully until it clicks.

Remove:

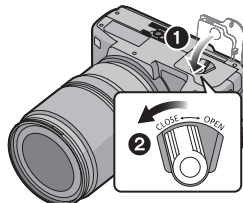
Push the lever (A) in the direction of the arrow to remove.



- Be careful of the direction indicated by the mark [▼] on the battery when inserting the battery.

3 ①: Close the battery door.

②: Slide the release lever in the direction of the arrow (CLOSE side) and then close it firmly.

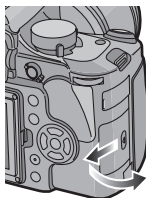


- Remove the battery after use.
- Do not remove the card or the battery while the card is being accessed. The data may be damaged. (P23)
- Do not remove the battery with the camera turned on since the settings on the camera may not be stored properly.
- The supplied battery is designed only for the camera. Do not use it with any other equipment.

Inserting/Removing the Card (Optional)

- Check that the camera is turned off.
- Close the flash.
- Prepare a card. (optional)

1 Slide the card door to open it.

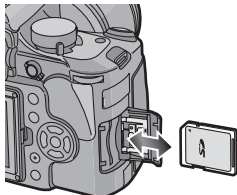


2 Insert:

Insert the card fully until it clicks and it is locked.

Remove:

Push the card until it clicks, then pull the card out upright.



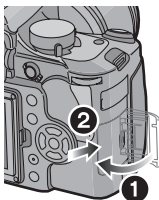
- Check the direction of the card.
- Do not touch the connection terminals on the back side of the card.
- The card may be damaged if it is not fully inserted.

3 ①:

Close the card door.

②:

Slide the card door to the end and then close it firmly.



- If the card door cannot be completely closed, remove the card and insert it again.

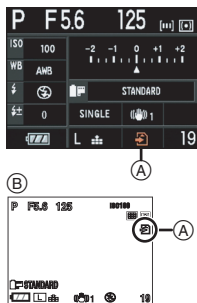


- Always turn the camera off before opening the card door.
- The card and the data may be damaged if it is inserted or removed while the camera is on.
- We recommend using a Panasonic SD Memory Card or SDHC Memory Card. (P6)

About the Card (optional)

■ Access to the card

The card access indication (A) lights when pictures are being recorded onto the card.



(B) When taking pictures with Live View When the card access indication lights, pictures are being read or deleted or the card is being formatted (P32). Do not:

- turn the camera off.
- remove the battery or the card.
- shake or impact the camera.
- disconnect the DC cable (DMW-DCC1; optional) if you use the AC adaptor (P128).

The card and the data may be damaged or the camera may not operate normally.

■ Card (optional)

- The SD Memory Card, SDHC Memory Card and MultiMediaCard are small, lightweight, removable external cards. Read P6 for information about cards that can be used in this unit.
- The SDHC Memory Card is a memory card standard decided by the SD Association in 2006 for high capacity memory cards more than 2 GB.

- The reading/writing speed of an SD Memory Card and an SDHC Memory Card is fast. Both types of card are equipped with a Write-Protect switch (A) that prevents writing and formatting the card. (If the switch is slid to the [LOCK] side, it is not possible to write or delete data on the card and format it. When the switch is slid to the other side, these functions become available.)



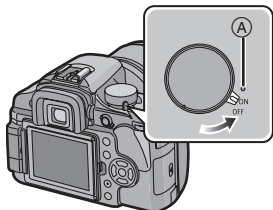
- This unit (SDHC compatible equipment) is compatible with SD Memory Cards based on SD Memory Card Specifications and formatted in FAT12 system and FAT16 system. It is also compatible with SDHC Memory Cards based on SD Memory Card Specifications and formatted in FAT32 system.
- You can use an SDHC Memory Card in equipment that is compatible with SDHC Memory Cards however you cannot use an SDHC Memory Card in equipment that is only compatible with SD Memory Cards. (Always read the operating instructions for the equipment being used. If you also order a photo studio to print pictures, ask the photo studio before printing.) (P6)
- Refer to P144 for information about the number of recordable pictures for each card.



- The data on the card may be damaged or lost due to electromagnetic waves, static electricity or breakdown of the camera or the card. We recommend storing important data on a PC etc.
- Do not format the card on your PC or other equipment. Format it on the camera only to ensure proper operation. (P32)
- Keep the Memory Card out of reach of children to prevent swallowing.

Turning the Camera On

Set the camera ON/OFF switch to [ON].



- The status indicator (A) lights when you set the switch to [ON]. The status indicator blinks if the remaining battery power becomes low.
- The camera turns off when you set the switch to [OFF].

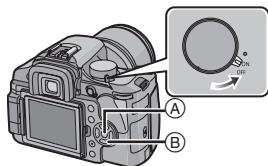
Dust reduction function

When the camera is turned on, the dust reduction function is automatically activated to shake off any dust on the front part of the image sensor.

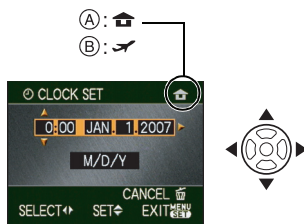

Changing the clock setting

- 2 Press ▲/▼/◀/▶ to select [CLOCK SET] in the [SETUP] menu [Y] and then press ▶. (P28)
- 3 Set as shown on steps 2 and 3.
- 4 Press [MENU/SET] to close the menu.



- When a fully charged battery has been inserted for more than 24 hours, charging of the built-in battery for the clock is completed so the clock setting will be stored (in the camera) for at least 3 months even if the battery is removed. (If you insert a battery that is not sufficiently charged, the length of time that the clock setting is stored may become less.) However the clock setting is canceled after this time. In this case, set the clock again.
- You can set the year from 2000 to 2099. The 24-hour system is used.
- If the date is not set in the camera it will not be printed correctly when you use a photo printing service, even if the store provides a date printing option for your photographs. (P113)
- If the date is set in the camera it will be printed correctly even if the date is not displayed on the screen of the camera.

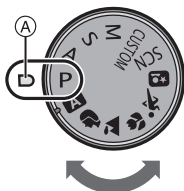
About the Mode Dial

If you turn on this unit and then rotate the mode dial, you can switch to a scene mode etc. that matches your recording purpose.

Switching the mode by rotating the mode dial

If [HIGHLIGHT] is set to [ON] in this case, the area directly illuminated by the photo flash will become white saturated and appear blinking in black and white on the LCD monitor.

- Video output is available in playback mode only.

[FORMAT]

It is not usually necessary to format a card.
Format it when the message [MEMORY CARD ERROR] appears.

- Formatting irretrievably deletes all the data including any protected pictures. Check the data carefully before formatting.
- If the card has been formatted on a PC or other equipment, format it on the camera again.
- Use a sufficiently charged battery (P18) or the AC adaptor (P128) when formatting.
- Do not turn the camera off during formatting.
- You cannot format an SD Memory Card or an SDHC Memory Card when the card's Write-Protect switch is set to [LOCK].
- If the card cannot be formatted, consult your nearest Service Center.

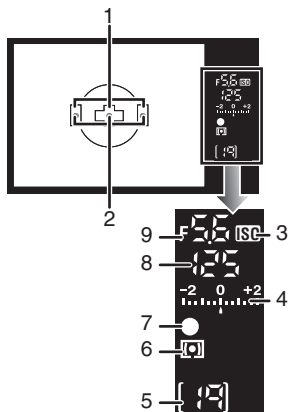

Tips for taking good pictures with Viewfinder

- Hold the camera gently with both hands, keep your arms still at your side and stand with your feet slightly apart.
- When taking pictures, make sure your footing is stable and there is no danger of colliding with another person, a ball etc.
- Make sure the camera does not shake when you press the shutter button.



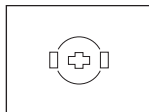
■ Direction detection function

Pictures recorded with the camera held vertically are played back vertically (rotated). (Only when [ROTATE DISP.] (P111) is set to [ON])

- Pictures may not be displayed vertically if they were taken with the camera aimed up or down.
- You can only use the direction detection function when using a compatible lens. (P13)
 (Refer to the catalog, website etc. for compatible lenses.)

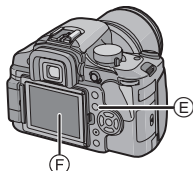

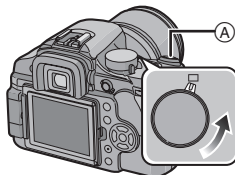

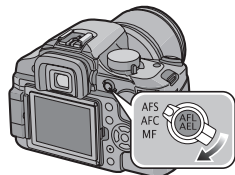

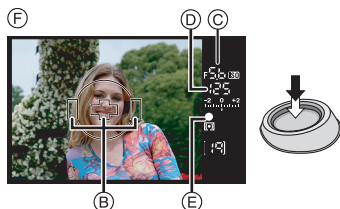
- (A) Shutter button

- “AFS” is an abbreviation of “Auto Focus Single”. The focus is fixed when you press the shutter button halfway.

2 Aim the AF frame (B) to the point you want to focus on and then press the shutter button halfway.



F Viewfinder Display

- You can check the aperture value (C) and shutter speed (D).
- The camera beeps and the focus indication (E) lights when the subject is focused.
- The focus indication blinks when the subject is not focused. In this case, a picture is not taken. Press the shutter button halfway to focus on the subject again.
- Refer to P39 for information about subjects that are difficult to focus on.
- The camera focuses on any of 3 focus area points— left, right or center in the AF frame and a lamp (AF-LED display) lights where the subject is focused. You can change the setting for the AF-LED display in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu. (P106)
- Refer to P38 for information about Program shift.
- **The focus range is 0.29 m (0.95 feet) to ∞. (when the supplied lens is attached)**
- If the ISO sensitivity is set to [ISO100] and the aperture value is set to F3.8 (when the supplied lens is attached), the shutter speed is automatically set between about 15 seconds and 1/4000th of a second.

3 Press the shutter button fully to take the picture.



- A picture is not taken until the subject is brought into focus.
- If you want to press the shutter button fully to take a picture even when the subject is not focused, set [FOCUS PRIORITY] in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu to [OFF]. (P106)



- We recommend checking that the clock is set properly before taking pictures. (P24)
- When a time is set for power save (P28), the camera automatically turns off if you do not operate it within the set time. To operate the camera again, press the shutter button halfway or turn the camera off and on.

■ Setting the AF frame for phase difference AF

If you press ◀ while taking pictures with the Viewfinder, the AF frame setting screen is displayed.

If you press ◀/▶, you can select the AF frame setting from AUTO (any of 3 focus area points— left, right or center), left fix, center fix or right fix.

- If you set [AUTO], the focus position is not predetermined. It is set to a position automatically determined by the camera at the time of focusing. If you want to determine the focus position to take pictures, select a setting other than [AUTO].

■ Program shift

In program AE mode, you can change the preset aperture value and shutter speed without changing the exposure. This is called program shift.

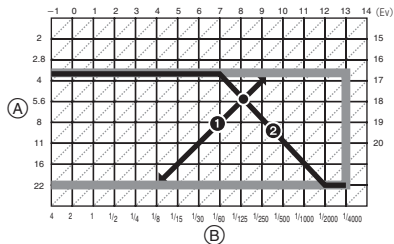
You can make the background more blurred by decreasing the aperture value or record a moving subject more dynamically by slowing the shutter speed when taking a picture in program AE mode.

- Press the shutter button halfway and then rotate the front dial to activate program shift while the aperture value and the shutter speed are displayed on the Viewfinder (about 10 seconds).



- The program shift indication (A) appears on the screen if program shift is activated.
- To cancel program shift, turn the camera off or rotate the front dial until the program shift indication disappears.

- You can change the operation method of the dials with [DIAL SET.] (P105) in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu.

- If the exposure is not adequate when the shutter button is pressed halfway, the aperture value and the shutter speed on the LCD monitor (information display screen) turn red. The aperture value and the shutter speed blink on the Viewfinder. (They do not blink when the flash is activated.)
- Program shift is canceled and the camera returns to normal program AE mode if more than 10 seconds pass after program shift is activated. However, the program shift setting is memorized.
- Depending on the brightness of the subject, program shift may not be activated.

Taking good pictures

■ Focusing

- **The focus range with auto focus is 0.29 m (0.95 feet) to ∞. (when the supplied lens is attached)**
 - If the distance between the camera and the subject is beyond the focus range of the camera, the picture may not be properly focused even if the focus indication lights.
 - The camera will not focus on subjects properly in the following cases.
 - When there are both near and distant subjects in a scene.
 - When there is dirt or dust on glass between the lens and the subject.
 - When there are illuminated or glittering objects around the subject.
 - When taking a picture in dark places.
 - When the subject is moving fast.
 - When the scene has low contrast.
 - When jitter occurs.
 - When recording a very bright subject.
 - When taking pictures of objects with a repeated pattern e.g. the windows on a building.
- We recommend taking pictures using AF/AE lock (P104). In dark places, the AF assist lamp (P106) may turn on for focusing on the subject.
- Even when the focus indication appears and the subject is focused, it is canceled if you release the shutter button. Press the shutter button halfway again.

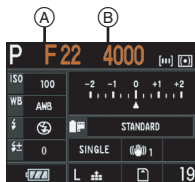
■ Preventing jitter (camera shake)

- Be careful of jittering when pressing the shutter button.
- We recommend using a tripod. Also, be careful how you hold the camera (P35). Using the self-timer (P74) or the remote shutter (DMW-RSL1; optional) (P127) prevents jittering caused by pressing the shutter button when you are using a tripod.

- Shutter speed will be slower particularly in the following cases. Keep the camera still from the moment the shutter button is pressed until the image appears. We recommend using a tripod.
 - Slow sync. (P65)
 - Slow sync./Red-eye reduction (P65)
 - In [NIGHT PORTRAIT] mode (P87)
 - When you set to a slow shutter speed (P42)

■ Exposure

- If [LCD AUTO] in the [SETUP] menu is set to [OFF] and you press the shutter button halfway when the exposure is not adequate, the aperture value (A) and the shutter speed (B) turn red. The aperture value and the shutter speed blink on the Viewfinder. (They do not blink when the flash is activated.)



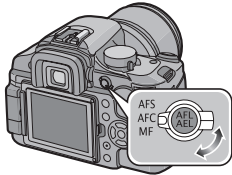
- When most of the subject is bright, such as during fine weather or snow, the recorded pictures may become dark. In these cases, compensate the exposure towards positive. (P44)

Continuously focusing on a subject (AFC) (When taking pictures with the Viewfinder)

This mode allows you to compose a picture more easily by continuously focusing on the movement of the subject while the shutter button is pressed halfway. When taking pictures of a moving subject, the camera predicts the movement of the subject and focuses on it. (motion prediction)

- Check that the camera is set to taking pictures with the Viewfinder. When taking pictures with Live View, press [LIVE VIEW] to switch the setting so the camera is set to taking pictures with the Viewfinder. (P35)

Set the focus mode lever to [AFC].



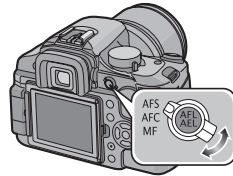
- “AFC” is an abbreviation of “Auto Focus Continuous”. The camera is continuously focusing on the subject while the shutter button is pressed halfway.
- It may take time to focus on the subject if you rotate the zoom ring from Wide to Tele or suddenly change the subject from a distant one to a nearby one.
- Press the shutter button halfway again when it is difficult to focus on the subject.
- Refer to P71 for information about focusing on the subject in burst mode.
- [AFC] in focus mode is not activated when taking pictures with Live View. If you switch the focus mode lever to [AFC], the message [SWITCH TO AFS] appears and [AFS] in focus mode is set.

Taking Pictures in Auto Mode



This mode allows beginners to take pictures easily. Only the basic functions appear in the menu to make operations simple.

Switch the focus mode lever to [AFS] or [AFC].

Aperture-priority AE [A]



Set the aperture value to a higher number when you want a sharp focus background. Set the aperture value to a lower number when you want a soft focus background.

1 Rotate the front dial left and right to set the aperture value.



2 Take a picture.



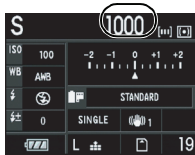
- You can change the operation method of the dials with [DIAL SET.] (P105) in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu.
- If [LCD AUTO] in the [SETUP] menu is set to [OFF] and you press the shutter button halfway when the exposure is not adequate, the aperture value and the shutter speed on the LCD monitor (information display screen) turn red. The aperture value and the shutter speed blink on the Viewfinder. (They do not blink when the flash is activated.)
- When most of the subject is bright, such as during fine weather or snow, the recorded pictures may become dark. In these cases, compensate the exposure towards positive. (P44)
- When you use a lens with an aperture ring, the setting for the front dial becomes effective if you rotate the aperture ring to the [A] position and the aperture ring setting takes priority if you rotate the aperture ring to a position other than [A].

Shutter-priority AE [S]



When you want to take a sharp picture of a fast moving subject, set with a faster shutter speed. When you want to create a trail effect, set to a slower shutter speed.

1 Rotate the front dial left and right to set the shutter speed.



2 Take a picture.



- You can change the operation method of the dials with [DIAL SET.] (P105) in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu.
- If [LCD AUTO] in the [SETUP] menu is set to [OFF] and you press the shutter button halfway when the exposure is not adequate, the aperture value and the shutter speed on the LCD monitor (information display screen) turn red. The aperture value and the shutter speed blink on the Viewfinder. (They do not blink when the flash is activated.)
- When most of the subject is bright, such as during fine weather or snow, the recorded pictures may become dark. In these cases, compensate the exposure towards positive. (P44)
- When the flash is activated, the shutter speed cannot be set to faster than 1/160th of a second. (P67)
- If you press the shutter button fully when the shutter speed is slow, the shutter speed on the screen counts down.

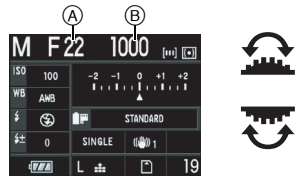
- We recommend using a tripod when the shutter speed is slow.
- You cannot set Slow sync. [S] and Slow sync./Red-eye reduction [S+]. (P65)
- Intelligent ISO sensitivity control cannot be set.
- The ISO sensitivity is automatically set to [AUTO] if you switch from intelligent ISO sensitivity control to shutter-priority AE mode.

- We recommend using a tripod or the remote shutter (DMW-RSL1; optional) when you take pictures with the shutter speed set to [B]. Refer to P127 for information about the remote shutter.
- When you take pictures with the shutter speed set to [B], noise may become

visible. To avoid picture noise, we recommend setting [LONG SHTR NR] in the [REC] mode menu to [ON] before taking pictures. (P103)

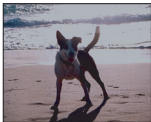

- If [LCD AUTO] in the [SETUP] menu is set to [OFF] and you press the shutter button halfway when the exposure is not adequate, the aperture value and the shutter speed on the LCD monitor (information display screen) turn red. The aperture value and the shutter speed blink on the Viewfinder.
- You cannot set the following items in manual exposure.
 - AUTO , AUTO/Red-eye reduction , Slow sync.  and Slow sync./Red-eye reduction 
 - Intelligent ISO sensitivity control or [AUTO] in ISO sensitivity. (The ISO sensitivity is automatically set to [ISO100] if you switch from Intelligent ISO sensitivity control or [AUTO] to manual exposure.)
 - Exposure compensation
- When you use a lens with an aperture ring, the aperture ring setting takes priority.

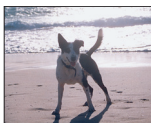

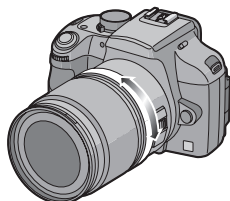


Use this function when you want to fix the focus or when the distance between the lens and the subject is determined and you do not want to activate auto focus.

1 Set the focus mode lever to [MF].

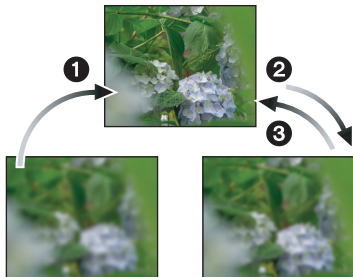

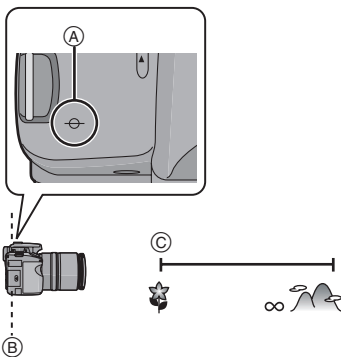

The focus distance reference mark is a mark used to measure the focus distance. Use this when taking pictures with manual focus or taking close-up pictures.

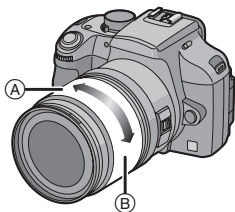


- If the distance between the camera and the subject is beyond the focus range of the camera, the picture may not be properly focused even if the focus indication lights.
- The available flash range is about 2.0 m (6.6 feet) to 5.5 m (18.0 feet) (Wide) (When the ISO sensitivity is set to [AUTO].). We recommend setting the flash to Forced OFF [🚫] when you take pictures at close range.
- If you are taking close-up pictures
 - We recommend using a tripod and the self-timer (P74).
 - The effective focus range (depth of field) is significantly narrowed. Therefore, if the distance between the camera and the subject is changed after focusing on the subject, it may become difficult to focus on it again.
 - The resolution of the periphery of the picture may decrease slightly. This is not a malfunction.

Taking Pictures with the Zoom



With the 14 mm to 50 mm focal length of the supplied lens (35 mm film camera equivalent: 28 mm to 100 mm), you can make people and subjects appear closer (up to 3.6× optical zoom) and landscapes can be recorded in wide angle.

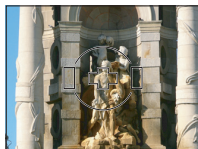

- This camera is based on the DCF standard “Design rule for Camera File system” which was established by the “Japan Electronics and Information Technology Industries Association (JEITA)”.
- The LCD monitor may not be able to display the details of the recorded pictures. You can use the playback zoom (P51) to check the details of the pictures.
- If you play back pictures that have been recorded with other equipment, the picture quality may deteriorate. (The pictures are displayed as [THUMBNAIL IS DISPLAYED] on the screen.)
- If you change a folder name or file name on your PC, the pictures may not play back on the camera.
- If you play back a non-standard file, the folder/file number is indicated by [—] and the screen may turn black.

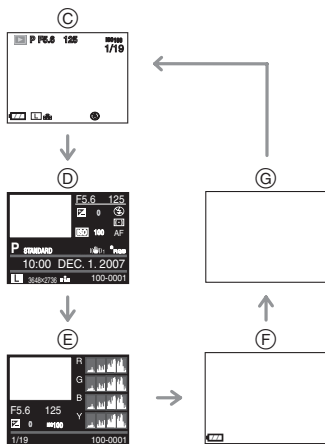

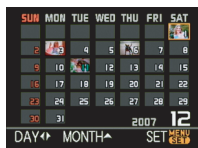
Displaying Pictures by Recording Date

(Calendar Playback)

You can display pictures by recording date using the calendar playback function.

■ To return to the 1 screen playback screen

After the calendar screen is displayed, rotate the rear dial right to display 25 screens, 9 screens (P52) and the 1 screen playback screen.



- The pictures are displayed without being rotated even if you set [ROTATE DISP.] to [ON]. (P111)
- You can display the calendar between January 2000 and December 2009.
- If the recording date of the picture selected in 25 screen multi playback is not between January 2000 and December 2009, the camera automatically displays it in the oldest calendar date.
- Pictures processed on a PC or other equipment may be displayed with dates different from the actual recording dates.
- If the date is not set in the camera (P24), the recording date is set as January 1st, 2007.
- If you take pictures after setting the travel destination in [WORLD TIME] (P129), the pictures are displayed by the dates at the travel destination in calendar playback.

Taking Pictures with Live View

You can take pictures while showing the subject on the LCD monitor. This is called Live View.

This is useful as it allows you to check the composition on the LCD monitor.

Press [LIVE VIEW] to switch to the Live View recording screen.

■ You can do the following when taking pictures with Live View

• Guide lines display (P55)

You can take pictures with well-designed composition by viewing the balance of the subject.

• Histogram display (P55)

You can display the exposure of a picture as a graph.

• LCD mode (P56)

You can set Power LCD to make the LCD monitor screen become brighter than normal and Auto power LCD to automatically activate Power LCD in bright places such as outdoors etc.

• AF mode setting (P60)

You can match the focus to the recording situation and the composition you want to take. You can only select face detection etc. if [LIVE VIEW AF] (P107) is set to [AF-ON].

• MF assist (P63)

You can enlarge a section of the screen for adjusting the focus.

• Aspect ratio (P94)

You can take pictures with a wide angle of view.

• Extended optical zoom (P97)

You can enlarge the picture with no picture quality deterioration.

• Digital zoom (P98)

You can further enhance the zoom magnification.



- Refer to P132 for information about the screen display when taking pictures with Live View.
- Attach the eye piece cap when taking pictures with Live View. (P17)
- The exposure and the color tone may differ when taking pictures with Live View and when taking pictures with the Viewfinder.
- [AFC] in focus mode is not activated when taking pictures with Live View. (P39) If you switch the focus mode lever to [AFC], the message [SWITCH TO AFS] appears and [AFS] in focus mode is set.

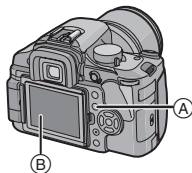
Tips for taking good pictures with Live View



- Hold the camera gently with both hands, keep your arms still at your side and stand with your feet slightly apart.
- Make sure the camera does not shake when you press the shutter button.
- Do not cover the AF assist lamp with your fingers or other objects.
- If the LCD monitor screen is difficult to see because of light from the sun etc. shining on it, we recommend using your hand or another object to block the light when using the camera.
- When holding the camera vertically, hold it with the AF assist lamp (A) at the top of the camera.

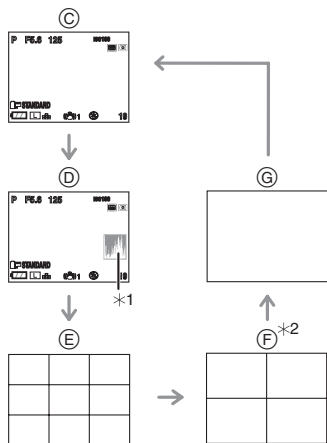

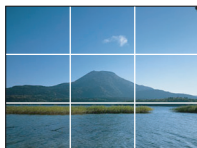

Recording guide lines display

When you align the subject on the horizontal and vertical guide lines or the cross point of these lines, you can take pictures with well-designed composition by viewing the size, the slope and the balance of the subject.

Guide line 1



Histogram

A histogram is a graph that displays brightness along the horizontal axis (black to white) and the number of pixels at each brightness level on the vertical axis. It allows you to easily check a picture's exposure.

- 1 When the values are distributed evenly, the exposure is proper and the brightness is well-balanced.
- 2 When the values are concentrated on the left, the picture is under exposed.
- 3 When the values are concentrated on the right, the picture is over exposed.

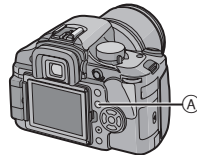


- When the recorded picture and the histogram do not match each other under the following conditions, the histogram is displayed in orange.
 - When the flash is activated.
 - When the flash is closed.
 - When the brightness of the LCD monitor is not correctly displayed in dark places.
 - When the exposure is not adequately adjusted.
 - The histogram is an approximation in recording mode.
 - The histogram displayed in this camera does not match histograms displayed by picture editing software used in PCs etc.
 - Check for any white saturated areas with the highlight feature when the auto review function is activated. (P30)

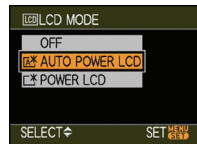
Brightening the LCD Monitor

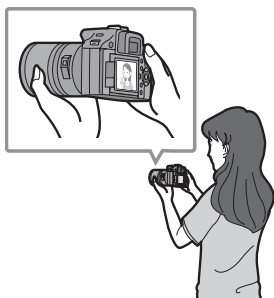


- The number of recordable pictures decreases in Auto power LCD mode or Power LCD mode.
- The brightness of the pictures displayed on the LCD monitor screen are increased in Auto power LCD and Power LCD. Therefore, some subjects may look different on the LCD monitor. However, this does not affect the recorded pictures.
- The LCD monitor automatically returns to normal brightness after 30 seconds when recording in Power LCD mode. Press any button to make the LCD monitor bright again.
- If the screen is difficult to see because of light from the sun etc. shining on it, use your hand or another object to block the light.
- Auto power LCD mode is not activated in the following case.
 - In playback mode [▶]

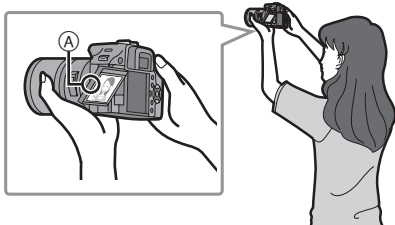

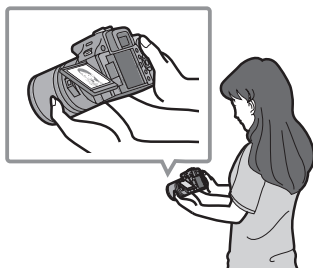

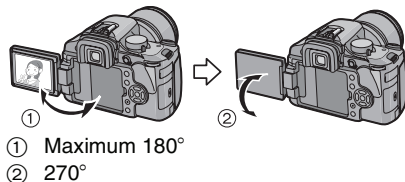

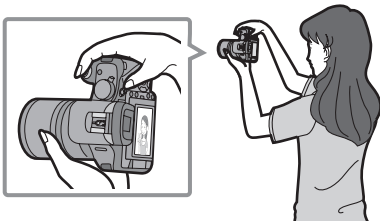

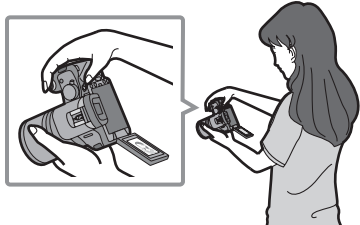

- When not using the LCD monitor it is recommended that you close it with the screen facing inwards to prevent dirt and scratches.

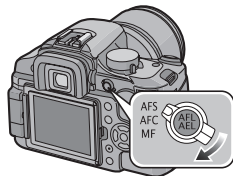

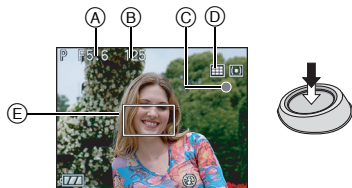











If auto focus is used when taking pictures with Live View, you can only take pictures with face detection (P60) etc. in AF mode if [LIVE VIEW AF] (P107) is set to contrast AF [AF].

1 Set the focus mode lever to [AFS].



2 Aim the screen at the point you want to focus on and then press the shutter button halfway.





- The camera beeps and the focus indication lights (green)  when the subject is focused.
- The focus indication blinks (green) when the subject is not focused. In this case, a picture is not taken. Press the shutter button halfway to focus on the subject again.
- Refer to P39 for information about subjects that are difficult to focus on.
- You can check the aperture value  and the shutter speed .
- If the AF mode  is set to , ,  or , the AF area  is not displayed until the picture is brought into focus. (P60)
- **The focus range is 0.29 m (0.95 feet) to ∞. (when the supplied lens is attached)**

3 Press the shutter button fully to take the picture.

- A picture is not taken until the subject is brought into focus.
- If you want to press the shutter button fully to take a picture even when the subject is not focused, set [FOCUS PRIORITY] in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu to [OFF]. (P106)
- The shutter sound is heard twice when 1 picture is taken. The first shutter sound is heard when the shutter returns to the position before a picture is taken and the second shutter sound is heard when the picture is actually taken.




- The camera automatically switches to phase difference AF  (P59) if you use a lens that does not support contrast AF (P13) even if [LIVE VIEW AF] (P107) in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu is set to  (P58).
- If you press the shutter button halfway when the exposure is not adequate, the aperture value and the shutter speed turn

red. (However, they do not turn red when the flash is activated.)

- The brightness of the LCD monitor may differ from the brightness of the recorded pictures especially when recording in dark places.

■ Switching to Phase difference AF

You can set Phase difference AF if you press [MENU/SET] to display the [CUSTOM MENU] menu and then set [LIVE VIEW AF] (P107) to .



- When you press the shutter button halfway, the mirror goes down and then goes up to enable the camera to focus. At this time, the same sound is heard as when the shutter button is pressed fully. However a picture is not taken.



- If the shutter button is pressed fully and then released, the shutter sound is heard. However a picture is not taken.
- The time between pressing the shutter button fully and the picture being taken (release time lag) becomes even longer than when taking pictures with the Viewfinder.

■ About face detection

This function detects a person's face in the image area so that the focus can be adjusted properly. This is particularly effective in preventing errors such as when the focus is on the background when taking a commemorative photograph.

- When the camera detects a person's face, the following color AF area is displayed.

Yellow:

When the shutter button is pressed halfway, the frame turns green when the camera is focused.

White:

Displayed when more than one face is detected. Other faces that are the same distance away as faces within the yellow AF areas are also focused.

- Up to 15 AF areas are displayed.
- When [👤] is selected and the metering mode is set to multiple [☉], the camera will adjust the exposure to suit the person's face.
- Under certain picture-taking conditions including the following cases, the face detection function may fail to work, making it impossible to detect faces. [AF] is switched to [📊].
 - When the face is not facing the camera
 - When the face is at an angle
 - When the face is extremely bright or dark
 - When there is little contrast on the faces
 - When the facial features are hidden behind sunglasses, etc.
 - When the face appears small on the screen
 - When there is rapid movement
 - When the subject is other than a human being
 - When the camera is shaking
- The face detection function is not activated when using the digital zoom.








- The AF area displayed is bigger than usual when taking pictures in dark places or when using the digital zoom.

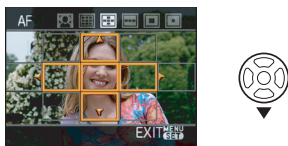
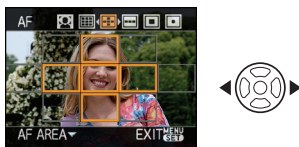


- The camera is focusing on all the AF areas when multiple AF areas (max. 9 areas) light at the same time. The focus position is not predetermined. It is set to a position automatically determined by the camera at the time of focusing. If you want to determine the focus position to take pictures, switch the AF mode to [📊] or [☉].
- If the AF mode is set to [📊], [📊], [📊] or [👤] the AF area is not displayed until the picture is brought into focus.
- Switch the AF mode to [📊] if it is difficult to focus using [☉].
- This setting is fixed to face detection when taking pictures with Live View in auto mode [A].
- It is not possible to set face detection in the following cases.
 - In [FOOD] in scene mode
- The camera automatically switches to phase difference AF [📊] (P59) if you use a lens that does not support contrast AF (P13) even if [LIVE VIEW AF] (P107) in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu is set to [📊] (P58).

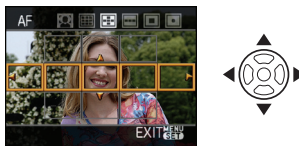

The flash is automatically activated when the recording conditions make it necessary.

⚡A👁 : **AUTO/Red-eye reduction**

The flash is automatically activated when the recording conditions make it necessary.

It is activated once before the actual recording to reduce the red-eye phenomenon (eyes of the subject appearing red in the picture) and then activated again for the actual recording.

- **Use this when you take pictures of people in low lighting conditions.**

⚡ : **Forced ON**

The flash is activated every time regardless of the recording conditions.

- **Use this when your subject is back-lit or under fluorescent light.**

⚡👁 : **Forced ON/ Red-eye reduction**

The flash is activated every time regardless of the recording conditions. Simultaneously it reduces the red-eye phenomenon.

- **Use this when your subject is back-lit or under fluorescent light.**

⚡S : **Slow sync.**

If you take a picture with a dark background landscape, this feature will slow the shutter speed when the flash is activated so that the dark background landscape will become bright.

- **Use this when you take pictures of people in front of a dark background.**

⚡S👁 : **Slow sync./Red-eye reduction**

If you take a picture with a dark background landscape, this feature will slow the shutter speed when the flash is activated so that the dark background landscape will become bright. Simultaneously it reduces the red-eye phenomenon.

- **Use this when you take pictures of people in front of a dark background.**

👁 : **Forced OFF**

The flash is fixed to Forced OFF [**👁**] when it is closed.







The flash is not activated in any recording conditions.

- **Use this when you take pictures in places where the use of the flash is not permitted.**

- * **The flash is activated twice. The interval between the first and second flash is longer when [**⚡A👁**], [**⚡👁**] or [**⚡S👁**] is set. The subject should not move until the second flash is activated.**

- The available flash range is an approximation.
- Refer to P78 for the ISO sensitivity.
- Refer to P39, 86 for the focus range.
- If the distance between the camera and the subject is less than 2.0 m (6.6 feet) when taking a picture with the flash, the photo flash will be obscured by the lens and one part of the screen will become dark. Check the distance between the camera and the subject when taking a picture.
- To avoid picture noise, we recommend reducing the ISO sensitivity before taking pictures. (P78)

- When the flash is activated, the shutter speed cannot be set to faster than 1/160th of a second.



- Do not look directly at the flash at close range when it is activated.
- Do not bring the flash too close to objects or close the flash while it is activated. The objects may be discolored by its heat or lighting.
- Do not cover the photo flash with your fingers or other objects.

- Do not carry the camera using the opened built-in flash.
- Do not close the flash soon after it is activated prior to taking pictures due to Auto/Red-eye reduction etc. It causes a malfunction.
- If you press the shutter button halfway when the flash is activated, the flash icon on the LCD monitor turns red.
- When you take a picture beyond the available flash range, the exposure may not be adjusted properly and the picture may become bright or dark.
- The white balance may not be properly adjusted if the flash level is insufficient. (P75)
- If you repeat taking a picture, it may not actually be taken even if the flash is activated. Take a picture after the access indication disappears.
- The red-eye reduction effect differs between people. Also, if the subject was far away from the camera or was not looking at the first flash, the effect may not be evident.
- When the flash is being charged, the flash icon blinks red, and you cannot take a picture even when you press the shutter button fully.
- When taking pictures in burst mode or auto bracket, only 1 picture is recorded for every flash activated.
- If you take pictures with the flash when the lens hood is attached, the flash may be obscured by the lens hood.
- When you attach an external flash, it takes priority over the built-in flash. Refer to P125 for the external flash.

Adjusting the flash output



Adjust the flash output when the subject is small or reflection ratio is extremely high or low.

1 Press [MENU/SET] to display the menu.

2 Press ▲/▼/◀/▶ to select [FLASH ADJUST.] in the [REC] menu [] and then press ▶.

3 Press ◀/▶ to adjust the flash output and then press [MENU/SET].



- Select [0] to return to the original flash output.

- You can adjust from [-2 EV] to [+2 EV] in steps of [1/3 EV].
- If you adjust the flash output, the adjusted flash output value is displayed on the LCD monitor. Also, [±] is displayed on the Viewfinder.
- The flash output setting is memorized even if the camera is turned off.

Setting to the 2nd Curtain Synchro



2nd curtain synchro activates the flash just before the shutter closes when taking pictures of moving objects such as cars using a slow shutter speed.

- The light source appears behind the subject and picture becomes dynamic.

- [2ND] is displayed in the flash icon on the LCD monitor if you set [FLASH SYNC.] to [2ND].
- The flash sync. settings are also effective when using an external flash. (P125)
- When a fast shutter speed is set, the effect of 2nd curtain synchro may deteriorate.
- You cannot set AUTO/Red-eye reduction [A], Forced ON/Red-eye reduction [S] or Slow sync./Red-eye reduction [S] when [FLASH SYNC.] is set to [2ND].

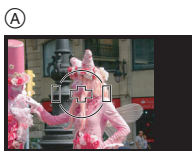

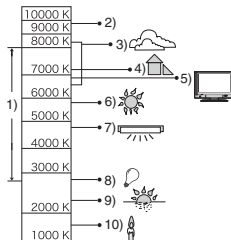


- [WB] is displayed on the Viewfinder if you set the white balance to a setting other than [AWB].

■ Auto white balance




The available white balance range is shown in the following illustration. When you take a picture beyond the available white balance range, the picture may appear reddish or bluish. Even within the confines of the range, the auto white balance may not operate properly if there are many light sources or there is no color close to white. In these cases, adjust the white balance.

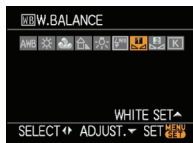

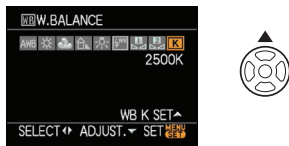

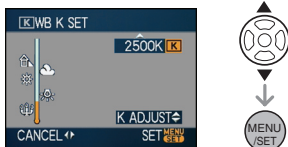
Setting the color temperature

You can set the color temperature manually for taking natural pictures in different lighting conditions. The color of light is measured as a number in degrees Kelvin. As the color temperature becomes high the picture becomes bluish and as the color temperature becomes low the picture becomes reddish. (P76)

1 Select [K] with step 2 on P75 and then press ▲.

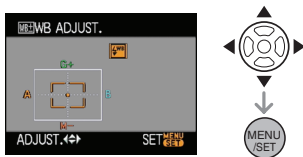
Finely adjusting the white balance

- The white balance fine adjustment setting is reflected in the picture when using the flash.

Setting the Light Sensitivity



ISO is a measure of sensitivity to light. The higher the sensitivity is set, the less light is needed to take a picture so the camera becomes more suitable for recording in dark places.

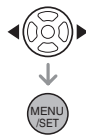

■ **About [ISO] (Intelligent ISO sensitivity control)**
(When taking pictures with Live View only)

The camera detects the movement of the subject near the center of the screen and then sets the optimal ISO sensitivity and shutter speed according to the movement and the brightness of the subject.

- Jitter is avoided when taking pictures indoors of a moving subject by increasing the ISO sensitivity and making the shutter speed faster.

- Noise is avoided when taking pictures indoors of a subject with no movement by decreasing the ISO sensitivity.



1/30 ISO200

- The shutter speed is not fixed when the shutter button is pressed halfway. It is continuously changing to match the movement of the subject until the shutter button is pressed fully. Confirm the actual shutter speed on the information display for the picture being played back.

■ Focus range (With the supplied lens)

- We recommend using a tripod and the self-timer in macro mode.
- When a subject is close to the camera, the effective focus range (depth of field) is significantly narrowed. Therefore, if the distance between the camera and the subject is changed after focusing on the subject, it may become difficult to focus on it again.
- If the distance between the camera and the subject is beyond the focus range of the camera, the picture may not be properly focused even if the focus indication lights.
- If [LIVE VIEW AF] is set to contrast AF when taking pictures with Live View, priority is given to a subject close to the camera so it takes longer to focus when taking pictures of a distant subject.
- The available flash range is about 2.0 m (6.6 feet) to 5.5 m (18.0 feet) (Wide). (When the ISO sensitivity is set to [AUTO].) We recommend setting the flash to Forced OFF  when you take pictures at close range.
- When you take pictures at close range, the resolution of the periphery of the picture may decrease slightly. This is not a malfunction.
- If the lens becomes dirty with fingerprints or dust, the lens may not be able to focus on the subject correctly.
- Digital zoom cannot be used.

[SPORTS]

Set here when you want to take pictures of sports scenes or other fast-moving events.

[NORMAL SPORTS]*

Controls the ISO sensitivity while stopping movement with a high shutter speed. (Intelligent ISO sensitivity control)

- When [NIGHT PORTRAIT] is selected, keep the subject still for about 1 second after taking the picture.
- When [NIGHT PORTRAIT] is selected, we recommend rotating the zoom lever to Wide (1×) and being about 2.0 m (6.6 feet) from the subject when taking a picture.

- Be sure to close the flash when not in use.
- The shutter may remain closed after taking the picture. This is due to signal processing and is not a malfunction.
- Noise may become visible when you take pictures in dark places.

- When [NIGHT PORTRAIT] is selected, the flash settings become Slow sync./ Red-eye reduction [], and the flash is activated every time.

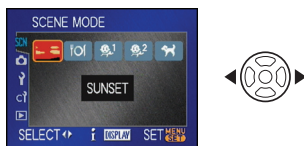

This takes pictures of a baby with a healthy complexion. When you use the flash, the light from it is weaker than usual.
You can set different birthdays in [BABY1] and [BABY2]. You can then display the ages when playing back the pictures.

- The age of the baby can be printed out using the [LUMIX Simple Viewer] or [PHOTOfunSTUDIO-viewer-] software on the CD-ROM (supplied). [For details on printing, refer to the operating instructions (PDF file) of the software.]

■ Age display setting

- To have the age displayed, first set the birthday and then be sure to set [WITH AGE] before taking the pictures.




■ Birthday setting

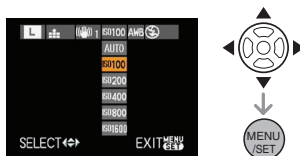

- In film mode, the camera may do something equivalent to pull processing or push processing to create a picture with particular characteristics. The shutter speed may become very slow at this time.

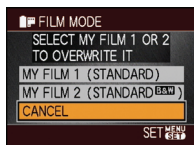



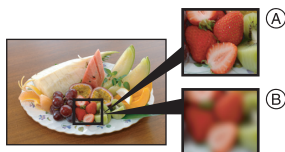

A digital picture is made of numerous dots called pixels. Although you cannot see the difference on the camera's screen, the more the pixels the finer the picture will be when it is printed on a large piece of paper or displayed on a computer monitor. Picture quality refers to the compression rate when saving digital pictures.

You can increase the number of recordable pictures without changing the picture size if quality is set to .

	Fine (Low compression): This gives priority to picture quality. Picture quality will be high.

	RAW+Fine: This sets the quality to [RAW] and also simultaneously creates a fine JPEG picture.
	RAW+Standard: This sets the quality to [RAW] and also simultaneously creates a standard JPEG picture.
	RAW: Set to process images in high-resolution on a PC. The maximum picture size for each aspect ratio is fixed. A JPEG is not created.

- You can enjoy more advanced picture editing if you use RAW files. You can save RAW files in a file format (JPEG, TIFF etc.) that can be displayed on your PC etc., develop them and edit them using the software "SILKYPIX Developer Studio" by Ichikawa Soft Laboratory on the CD-ROM (supplied).






- If you set [EX. OPT. ZOOM] (P97) to [ON] when taking pictures with Live View, [EZ] is displayed on the screen when the picture size is set to a size other than the maximum picture size for each aspect ratio. "EZ" is an abbreviation of "Extended optical Zoom".

**[OIS MODE]****Optical Image Stabilizer**

Press [MENU] to display the [REC] mode menu and select the item to set. (P26)
This mode detects jitter and compensates for it.

- Check that the [O.I.S.] switch on the lens is set to [ON].

<p>[MODE1] ()</p>	<p>Camera shake is corrected at all times in the mode for taking pictures. It enables you to take pictures with stability after deciding on the composition using the telephoto function.</p>
<p>[MODE2] ()</p>	<p>Camera shake is corrected when the shutter button is pressed. The resulting correction is more effective.</p>
<p>[MODE3] ()</p>	<p>Camera shake is corrected for up/down movements. This mode is ideal for panning (a method of taking pictures which involves turning the camera to track the movements of a subject which continues to move in a fixed direction).</p>



- The stabilizer function may not be effective in the following cases.
 - When there is a lot of jitter.
 - When the zoom magnification is high.
 - When using the digital zoom.
 - When taking pictures while following a moving subject.
 - When the shutter speed becomes slower to take pictures indoors or in dark places.
- Be careful of camera jitter when you press the shutter button.
- You cannot select [OIS MODE] in the following cases.

Normally you can take pictures with a maximum focal length of 50 mm (35 mm film camera equivalent: 100 mm) using the supplied lens.

However, if you set [EX. OPT. ZOOM] to [ON] when the picture size is set to a size other than the maximum picture size for each aspect ratio ([4:3]/[3:2]/[16:9]), a maximum focal length of 89 mm can be achieved (35 mm film camera equivalent: 178 mm) with no picture quality deterioration.

Removing picture noise when taking pictures

If you set [ON], the camera automatically removes noise that appears when the shutter speed becomes slower to take pictures of night scenery etc. so you can take beautiful pictures.
If you set [ON], the countdown screen is displayed when the shutter button is pressed. Do not move the camera at this time. After the countdown is finished, [PLEASE WAIT...] is displayed for the same time as the selected shutter speed for signal processing.
We recommend using a tripod when the shutter speed is slowed to take pictures.



Press [MENU/SET] to display the [CUSTOM MENU] menu and select the item to set. (P26)

[OFF] This gives priority to the best time to take a picture so you can take a picture when the shutter button is pressed fully.

[ON] You cannot take a picture until the subject is brought into focus.

- If you set [OFF], be careful as the picture may not be properly focused even if [AFS] or [AFC] in focus mode is set.

[AF ASSIST LAMP]

Press [MENU/SET] to display the [CUSTOM MENU] menu and select the item to set. (P26)

Illuminating the subject makes it easier for the camera to focus when recording in low light conditions that make focusing difficult.

[OFF] The AF assist lamp does not turn on.

[ON] The AF assist lamp (the flash or the AF assist lamp) turns on when you press the shutter button halfway in dark places etc.

- The flash is activated as an AF assist lamp if you use the flash when taking pictures with the Viewfinder or if phase difference AF is activated when taking pictures with Live View, The AF assist lamp will not work when the flash is closed.
- When using contrast AF, the AF assist lamp turns on even when the flash is used. The effective range of the AF assist lamp is about 1.0 m (3.3 feet) to about 3.0 m (9.8 feet). (when the supplied lens is attached and at Wide)
- Be careful about the following when using the AF assist lamp.

- Do not look at the AF assist lamp from too close up.
- Do not attach the lens hood.
- Do not cover the AF assist lamp with your fingers or other objects.

- When you do not want to use the AF assist lamp (e.g. when taking pictures of animals in dark places), set the [AF ASSIST LAMP] to [OFF]. In this case, it will become more difficult to focus on the subject.
- The setting is fixed to [ON] in auto mode [A].
- When you use a lens with a large filter diameter that obscures the AF assist lamp, shadows may appear on the picture and the performance of the camera may deteriorate.
- The setting for the [AF ASSIST LAMP] is fixed to [OFF] in [SCENERY] mode, [NIGHT SCENERY], [ILLUMINATIONS] or [CREATIVE NIGHT SCENERY] in [NIGHT PORTRAIT] mode, and [SUNSET] in scene mode.

- When [ROTATE DISP.] is set to [ON], pictures recorded holding the camera vertically are played back vertically (rotated).
(You can only use this when using a lens that supports the direction detection function. (P13))
- If you take pictures when aiming the camera up or down, it may not be possible to display the pictures vertically. (P35)
- The picture may be slightly blurred when the camera is connected to the TV with the video cable (supplied) and played back vertically.
- When you play back pictures on a PC, they cannot be displayed in the rotated direction unless the OS or software is compatible with Exif. Exif is a file format for still pictures which allows recording information etc. to be added. It was established by “JEITA (Japan Electronics and Information Technology Industries Association)”.
- Rotated pictures are displayed rotated when they are played back in review playback and playback zoom however are displayed without being rotated when they are played back in multi playback.
- It may not be possible to rotate pictures that have been recorded with other equipment.

[DPOF PRINT]

Setting the picture to print and the number of prints

Press [MENU/SET] to display the [PLAY] mode menu and select the item to set. (P108)
DPOF “Digital Print Order Format” is a system that allows the user to select which pictures to print, how many copies of each picture to print and whether or not to print the recording date on the pictures when using a DPOF compatible photo printer or photo printing store. For details, ask at your photo printing store.

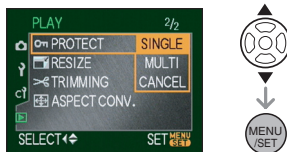


- DPOF is an abbreviation of “Digital Print Order Format”. This feature allows you to write print information to media and then use the information on a DPOF-compliant system.
- DPOF print setting is a convenient function when printing pictures with a printer that supports PictBridge. The date printing setting on the printer may take priority over the date printing setting on the camera. Check the date printing setting on the printer also. (P120)
- Some DPOF information set by other equipment cannot be used. In such cases, delete all of the DPOF information and then set it again with this camera.
- If the file is not based on the DCF standard, the DPOF print setting cannot be set. DCF is an abbreviation of “Design rule for Camera File system”, stipulated by “JEITA (Japan Electronics and Information Technology Industries Association)”.
- Pictures that were taken with the [QUALITY] set to [RAW] cannot be printed using DPOF print.

[PROTECT] Preventing accidental erasure of pictures

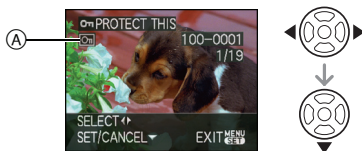

- Files that do not conform to the DCF standard cannot be converted. DCF is an abbreviation of “Design rule for Camera File system”, stipulated by JEITA “Japan Electronics and Information Technology Industries Association”.
- You may not be able to convert pictures taken on other equipment.

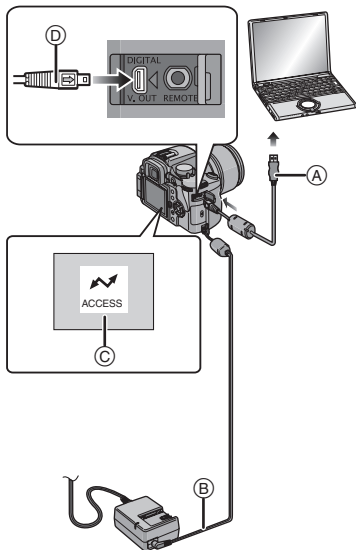
Connecting to a PC



You can acquire recorded pictures to a PC by connecting the camera and the PC. The software [LUMIX Simple Viewer] or [PHOTOfunSTUDIO-viewer-] (for Windows®) on the CD-ROM (supplied) allows you to easily acquire pictures recorded with the camera to a PC, print them and send them by e-mail.

If you use "Windows 98/98SE", install the USB driver and then connect it to the computer.

Read the separate operating instructions for the supplied software for more information about the software in the CD-ROM (supplied) and how to install it.

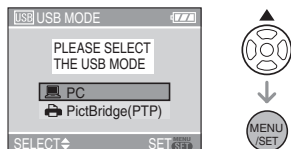

3 Press ▲ to select [PC] and then press [MENU/SET].

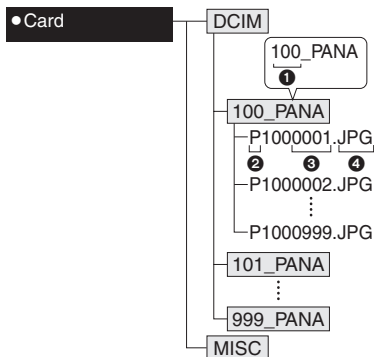

The picture is not recorded in the same folder as the previously recorded picture in the following cases. It is recorded in a folder with a new number.

- ① When the folder just recorded to contains a picture file with the number 999 in it (example: P1000999.JPG).
- ② When the card just recorded to contains, for example, a folder with the number 100 [100_PANA] in it and that card is removed and replaced with a card that has a folder with the number 100 in it recorded by a camera from a different maker (100XXXXX, with XXXXX being the name of the maker) and then a picture is recorded.
- ③ When recording after selecting [NO.RESET] (P29) from the [SETUP] menu. (Pictures will be recorded to a new folder with a number sequential to the folder recorded to immediately before. By using [NO.RESET] on a card that does not contain folders or pictures, such as one just formatted, the folder number can be reset to 100.)

■ PictBridge (PTP) setting

Even if you set [USB MODE] to [PictBridge (PTP)], you can connect to your PC if the OS is “Windows XP”, “Windows Vista” or “Mac OS X”.

- Pictures can only be read on the camera. They cannot be written to a card or deleted.
- When there are 1000 or more pictures on a card, the pictures may not be imported.



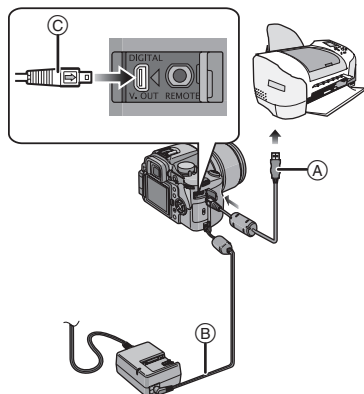
- Do not use any other USB connection cables except the supplied one.
- Do not disconnect the USB connection cable while [ACCESS] is displayed.
- If battery power is exhausted while the camera and the PC are communicating, the recorded data may be damaged. Use a battery with sufficient battery power (P18) or the AC adaptor (P128).
- If the remaining battery power becomes low while the camera and the PC are communicating, the status indicator blinks and the alarm beeps. In this case, stop the communication at once on the PC.
- **When connecting the camera to a “Windows 2000” OS PC with the USB connection cable, do not replace the card while the camera and the PC are connected. The information on the card may be damaged. Disconnect the USB connection cable before replacing the card.**
- Pictures edited or rotated with a PC may be displayed in black in playback mode (P48), multi playback (P52) and calendar playback (P53).
- For information about this, refer to the separate operating instructions for PC connection.
- Read the operating instructions for the PC.

Printing the Pictures



By connecting the camera directly to a printer supporting PictBridge via the USB connection cable (supplied), you can select the pictures to print and start printing on the camera's screen.

Set print settings such as the print quality on the printer beforehand. (Read the printer operating instructions.)

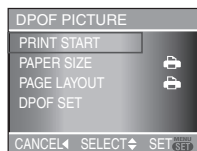
■ DPOF picture

- Set the DPOF print setting on the camera in advance. (P112)

1 Press ▼ to select [DPOF PICTURE] and then press [MENU/SET].



2 Press ▲ to select [PRINT START] and then press [MENU/SET].



- You cannot select [PRINT START] when the DPOF print setting is not set. Select [DPOF SET] and then set the DPOF print setting. (P112)
- Press [MENU/SET] to cancel printing.

3 Disconnect the USB connection cable after printing.

■ Setting the date printing with the DPOF print in advance

We recommend setting DPOF date printing with [DPOF PRINT] (P112) in advance when the printer supports it. If you select [DPOF PICTURE], printing starts and the recording date is printed.

■ Layout printing

• When printing a picture several times on 1 sheet of paper

For example, if you want to print a picture 4 times on 1 sheet of paper, set [PAGE LAYOUT] to [4x4] and then set [NUM. OF PRINTS] to 4.

• When printing different pictures on 1 sheet of paper (only in DPOF printing)

For example, if you want to print 4 different pictures on 1 sheet of paper, set [PAGE LAYOUT] to [4x4] and then set [COUNT] in [DPOF PRINT] (P112) to 1 for each of the 4 pictures.



- Do not disconnect the USB connection cable when the cable disconnection warning icon [⚡] is displayed. (Depending on the printer, the icon may not be displayed.)
- If the remaining battery power becomes low while the camera and the printer are connected, the status indicator blinks and the alarm beeps. If this happens during printing, press [MENU/SET] and stop printing at once. If not printing, disconnect the USB connection cable.
- The camera is receiving an error message from the printer when the [●] indication lights orange during printing. After finishing printing, make sure there are no problems with the printer.

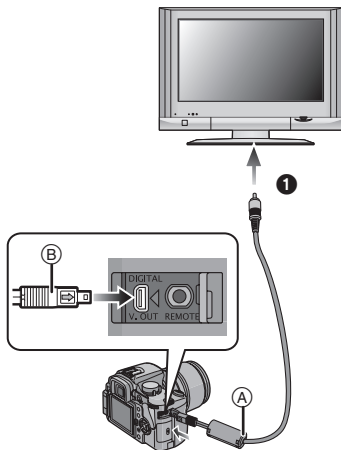
- If the total number of DPOF prints or the number of DPOF pictures printed is high, pictures may be printed several times. The remaining number of prints indicated may differ from the number set. This is not a malfunction.
- With date printing, the setting on the printer may take priority over the setting on the camera. Check the date print setting on the printer also.
- If the printer does not support RAW printing, the JPEG picture recorded simultaneously is printed. If no JPEG picture was recorded simultaneously, printing may not be possible.

Playing Back Pictures on a TV Screen



■ Playing back pictures using the Video cable (supplied)

- Set the [TV ASPECT]. (P31)
- Turn the camera and the TV off.



1 Connect the video cable (A) to the [V. OUT] socket on the camera.

- Connect the video cable with the [➡] mark facing the [◀] mark on the [DIGITAL] socket.
- Hold the video cable at (B) and insert straight in or take straight out.

2 Connect the video cable to the video input socket on the TV.

- ① Yellow: to the video input socket

3 Turn the TV on and select external input.

4 Turn the camera on and then press [▶].



- Do not use any other Video cables except the supplied one.
- Press [▶] to display pictures on the TV. You can display pictures on the TV only when they are being displayed on the LCD monitor.
- The top and bottom or left and right of the picture may be cut off slightly when it is displayed due to the characteristics of the TV.
- Depending on the screen mode setting of the TV when you connect the camera to a wide-screen TV or a high-definition TV, the picture may be stretched horizontally or vertically and the top and bottom or left and right of the picture may be cut off when it is displayed. In this case, change the screen mode setting.
- Read the operating instructions for the TV.
- When you play back a picture vertically, it may be blurry.
- You can view pictures on TVs in other countries (regions) which use the NTSC or PAL system when you set [VIDEO OUT] in the [SETUP] menu.
- Even if you set [VIDEO OUT] to [PAL], the output signal will still be NTSC in the recording mode.

■ Playing back pictures on a TV with an SD Card slot

Still pictures recorded on an SD Card or an SDHC Memory Card can be played back on a TV with an SD Memory Card slot.



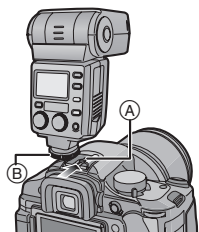
- Depending on the TV model, pictures may not be displayed on the full screen.
- You may not be able to play back MultiMediaCards.

Using the External Flash

If you use an external flash, the available flash range increases compared to the camera's built-in flash.

■ Using the dedicated flash (DMW-FL500; optional)

1 Attach the dedicated flash to the hot shoe (A) and then turn on the camera and the dedicated flash.



- Be sure to firmly secure the dedicated flash with the lock ring (B).

2 Press [MENU/SET] to display the menu.

3 Press ▲/▼/◀/▶ to select [FLASH] in the [REC] menu [📷] and then press ▶.

4 Press ▲/▼ to select the mode and then press [MENU/SET].

5 Press [MENU/SET] to close the menu.


- You can also press the shutter button halfway to close the menu.

■ When using other commercially available external flashes without communication functions with the camera (DMC-L10)

- It is necessary to set the exposure on the external flash. If you want to use the external flash in auto mode, use an external flash that allows you to set the aperture value and the ISO sensitivity to match the settings on the camera.
- Set to Aperture-priority AE mode [A] or Manual exposure mode [M] on the camera and then set the same aperture value and ISO sensitivity on the external flash. (The exposure cannot be compensated adequately due to the change on the aperture value in Shutter-priority AE mode [S] and the external flash cannot control the light adequately in Program AE mode [P] because the aperture value cannot be fixed.)



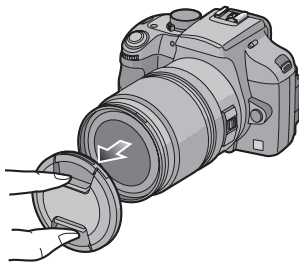
- You can also use [FUNC] to set. (P91)
- You can set the aperture value, the shutter speed and the ISO sensitivity on the camera even when attaching the external flash.
- Some commercial external flashes have synchro terminals with high-voltage or reversed polarity. Using such external flashes may cause a malfunction or the camera may not operate normally. Be sure to use Panasonic's external flash (DMW-FL500).

- If you use commercially available external flashes with communication functions other than the dedicated one, they may not operate normally or they may be damaged. Do not use them.
- **Even if the external flash is turned off, the camera may enter the external flash mode when the external flash is attached. When you are not using the external flash, detach it.**
- When attaching the external flash, the built-in flash cannot be activated.
- Do not open the built-in flash when an external flash is attached.
- When attaching the external flash, the camera will become unstable.
- Detach the external flash when carrying the camera.
- When attaching the external flash, do not hold only the external flash because it may detach from the camera.
- If you use the external flash when the white balance is set to [] (Flash) finely adjust the white balance depending on the picture quality. (P77)
- If you take pictures close to the subject in Wide, the vignetting effect may appear on the bottom of the recorded picture.
- **Read the operating instructions of the external flash for details.**

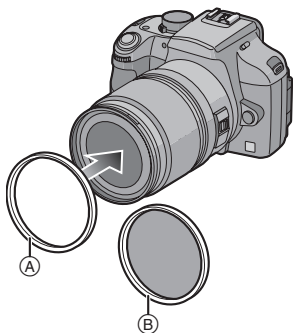
Using the MC Protector/PL Filter

The MC protector is a transparent filter which affects neither the colors nor the amount of light, so it can always be used to protect the camera's lens. Also, the PL filter reduces diffused light reflection so you can take pictures with increased contrast.

1 Detach the lens cap.



2 Attach the MC protector (A) or the PL filter (B).



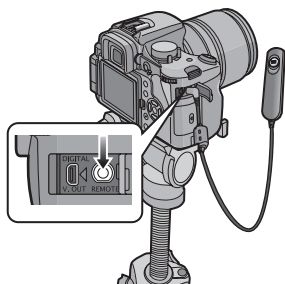
- You cannot attach the MC protector and the PL filter at the same time.
- If the MC protector/PL filter are tightened too much, you may not be able to remove them. Do not tighten them too much.

- If the MC protector/PL filter are dropped, they may be destroyed. Be careful not to drop them when attaching them to the camera.
- You can attach the lens cap or the lens hood when the MC Protector and the PL Filter are attached.
- Read the operating instructions of the MC protector or the PL filter for details.
- Use the MC protector (DMW-LMCH67; optional) and the PL filter (DMW-LPL67; optional) with the supplied lens.

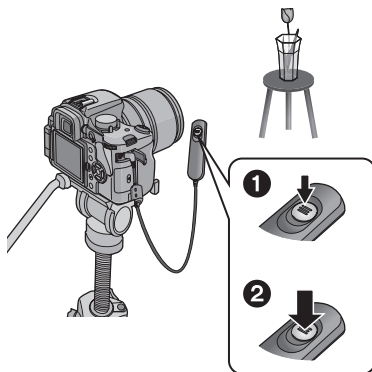
Using the Remote Shutter

If you use the remote shutter (DMW-RSL1; optional), you can avoid jitter (camera shake) when using a tripod and you can keep the shutter pressed fully when taking pictures with [B] (Bulb) or burst mode. The remote shutter works similar to the shutter button on the camera.

1 Firmly connect the remote shutter to the [REMOTE] socket on the camera as far as it will go.

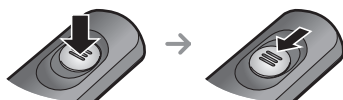


- 2 Press the button fully to take the picture. (Press it as far as it will go.)



■ About [LOCK] on the remote shutter

- You can keep the shutter button pressed fully. This is effective when taking pictures with [B] (Bulb) (P43) or in burst mode (P71).

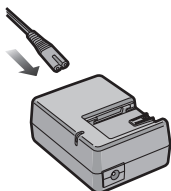

Using the AC Adaptor

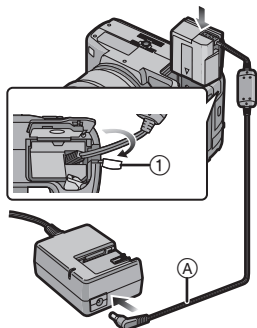
You can use the camera without worrying about battery discharge when it is connected to a PC or a printer if you use the DC cable (DMW-DCC1; optional) to connect the camera to the battery charger/AC adaptor (supplied) and connect the AC cable.

- Check that the camera is turned off.
- Close the flash.

1 Connect the AC cable.



2 Connect the DC cable (A).



- Pull open the DC cable cover ① and then connect the DC cable to the camera body using the same steps as “Inserting/Removing the Battery” (P21). Pull the DC cable through the opening as shown in the illustration and then close the battery door.
- Be careful not to catch the DC cable when closing the battery door.

- You cannot charge the battery if you connect the DC cable (DMW-DCC1; optional).



- Be sure to use the supplied AC cable and the prescribed DC cable (DMW-DCC1; optional) when using the battery charger/AC adaptor (supplied) as an AC adaptor.
- The camera becomes warm during use. This is not a malfunction.
- Disconnect the charger/AC adaptor and DC cable when the camera is not in use.
- The unit is in the standby condition when the AC adaptor is connected. The primary circuit is always “live” as long as the AC adaptor is connected to an electrical outlet.

Displaying the Time at the Travel Destination (World Time)

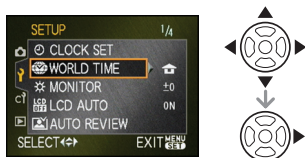


If you set your home area and the travel destination area when traveling abroad etc., the local time at the travel destination area can be displayed on the screen and recorded on the pictures taken.

• Select [CLOCK SET] to set the current date and time in advance. (P24)

1 Press [MENU/SET] to display the menu.

2 Press ▲/▼/◀/▶ to select [WORLD TIME] in the [SETUP] menu [?] and then press ▶.



• If you are setting the world time for the first time, the message [PLEASE SET THE HOME AREA] appears. If this message appears, press [MENU/SET] and then set home area from the screen shown in step **2** in “Setting the home area [HOME]”.

■ Setting the home area [HOME]

(Perform steps **1**, **2**.)

1 Press ▼ to select [HOME] and then press [MENU/SET] to set.



2 Press ◀/▶ to select your home area and then press [MENU/SET] to set.



- The current time is displayed on the top left of the screen and the time difference from GMT “Greenwich Mean Time” is displayed on the bottom left of the screen.
- If daylight saving time [☀️🌙] is used at the home area, press ▲. Press ▲ again to return to the original time.
- The daylight saving time setting for the home area does not advance the current time. Advance the clock setting by one hour. (P24)

■ Finishing setting the home area

- If you are setting the home area for the first time, the screen returns to the screen shown in step **1** of “Setting the home area [HOME]” after you press [MENU/SET] to set your home area. Press ◀ to return to the screen shown in step **2** and then press [MENU/SET] to close the menu.
- If you are setting the home area for the second time etc., the screen returns to the screen shown in step **2** after you press [MENU/SET] to set your home area. Press [MENU/SET] again to close the menu.

Cautions for Use

■ Optimal use of the camera

Take care not to drop or knock the unit or put a lot of pressure on it.

- Take care not to knock or drop the bag/case that you inserted the camera in as the shock may cause damage to the camera, lens or LCD monitor.
- Do not use a paper bag as it can easily rip causing the camera to fall and be damaged.
- We strongly recommend you purchase a good camera bag/case from your local dealer to protect your camera.

Keep the camera as far away as possible from electromagnetic equipment (such as microwave ovens, TVs, video games etc.).

- If you use the camera on top of or near a TV, the pictures on the camera may be disrupted by electromagnetic wave radiation.
- Do not use the camera near cell phones because doing so may result in noise adversely affecting the pictures.
- Recorded data may be damaged, or pictures may be distorted, by strong magnetic fields created by speakers or large motors.
- Electromagnetic wave radiation generated by microprocessors may adversely affect the camera, disturbing the pictures.
- If the camera is adversely affected by electromagnetic equipment and stops functioning properly, turn the camera off and remove the battery or disconnect AC adaptor. Then reinsert the battery or reconnect AC adaptor and turn the camera on.

Do not use the camera near radio transmitters or high-voltage lines.

- If you record near radio transmitters or high-voltage lines, the recorded pictures may be adversely affected.

Always use the supplied cords and cables. If you use optional accessories, use the cords and the cables supplied with them.

Do not extend the cords or the cables.

Do not spray the camera with insecticides or volatile chemicals.

- If the camera is sprayed with such chemicals, the body of the camera may be damaged and the surface finish may peel off.
- Do not keep rubber or plastic products in contact with the camera for a long period of time.

Do not use benzine, thinner or alcohol for cleaning the camera.

- Remove the battery or disconnect the AC adaptor from the electrical outlet before wiping the camera.
- The body of the camera may be damaged and the surface finish may peel off.
- Wipe off any dust or fingerprints with a soft, dry cloth.
- Wipe off any dust or dirt on the zoom ring and the focus ring with a dry, dust cloth.
- Do not use a kitchen detergent or a chemically treated cloth.

About dirt on the image sensor

This camera features an interchangeable lens system so dirt may get inside the camera body when changing lenses. Depending on the recording conditions, dirt on the image sensor may appear on the recorded picture.

Do not change lenses where there is a lot of dust, and always attach the body cap when a lens is not attached to the camera, so that dirt or dust does not get inside the camera body. Remove any dirt on the body cap before attaching it.

Clean any dirt on the image sensor using the steps below.

Removing dirt on the image sensor

Black spots may appear on the recorded picture if dirt or dust gets on the image sensor. The image sensor is very delicate and easily scratched. If it becomes necessary to clean the image sensor, always use the following steps.

- Use a sufficiently charged battery (P18) or the AC adaptor (P128) when cleaning. If you use the battery and the remaining battery power becomes low during cleaning, the shutter will close and the shutter curtains and the mirror may be damaged.

1: Detach the lens. (P15)

2: Turn the camera on.

3: Press [LIVE VIEW] to switch to the Live View recording screen.

- The mirror rises and the shutter curtains open.

4: Clean the image sensor.

- Blow off the dust on the surface of the image sensor with a commercially available blower brush. Be careful not to blow too strongly.
- Do not put the blower brush further inside than the lens mount.
- Do not let the blower brush touch the image sensor as the image sensor may get scratched.
- Do not use any objects except a blower brush to clean the image sensor.

5: Turn the camera off.

- The shutter curtains close and the mirror goes down when the camera is turned off. Be careful that the blower brush does not get caught in the shutter curtains.

■ About the LCD monitor

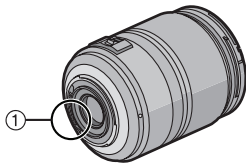
• Do not press the LCD monitor with excessive force. Uneven colors may appear on the LCD monitor and it may malfunction.

- If the camera is cold when you turn it on, the picture on the LCD monitor will be slightly darker than usual at first. However, the picture will return to normal brightness when the internal temperature of the camera increases.

Extremely high precision technology is employed to produce the LCD monitor screen. However there may be some dark or bright spots (red, blue or green) on the screen. This is not a malfunction. The LCD monitor screen has more than 99.99% effective pixels with a mere 0.01% of the pixels inactive or always lit. The spots will not be recorded on pictures on a card.

■ About the Lens

- Do not press the lens with excessive force.
- Do not leave the camera with the lens facing the sun as rays of light from the sun may cause it to malfunction. Also, be careful when placing the camera outside or near a window.
- When there is dirt (water, oil, and fingerprints, etc.) on the surface of the lens, the picture may be affected. Lightly wipe the surface of the lens with a soft, dry cloth before and after taking pictures.
- Do not place the lens mount facing downwards. Do not allow the lens mount contacts ① to become dirty.



■ Battery

The battery is a rechargeable lithium ion battery.

Its ability to generate power comes from the chemical reaction that takes place inside it. This reaction is susceptible to the surrounding temperature and humidity. If the temperature is too high or too low, the operating time of the battery will become shorter.

After use, be sure to remove the battery.

Bring charged spare batteries when going out.

- Be aware that the operating time of the battery becomes shorter in low temperature conditions such as at a ski resort.
- When you travel, do not forget to bring the charger (supplied) so that you can charge the battery in the country that you are traveling in.

If you drop the battery accidentally, check to see if the body of the battery and the terminals are damaged.

- Inserting a damaged battery in the camera will damage the camera.

Dispose of unusable battery.

- Batteries have a limited life.
- Do not throw batteries into fire because it may cause an explosion.
- Unusable batteries should be discarded in accordance with battery recycling laws. Call the RBRC hotline at 1-800-822-8837 for information.

Do not allow battery terminals to come into contact with metal objects (such as necklaces, hairpins etc.).

- This can cause short circuiting or heat generation and you may be badly burned if you touch a battery.

■ Charger

- If you use the battery charger near a radio, the radio reception may be disturbed.
- Keep the charger 1 m (3.3 feet) or more away from radios.
- When the charger is in use, it may generate whirring sounds. However, this is not a malfunction.
- After use, be sure to disconnect the AC cable from the electrical outlet. (A maximum of about 0.1 W is used if you leave it connected.)
- Keep the terminal of the charger clean.

■ Card

Do not leave the card where the temperature is high, where electromagnetic waves or static electricity are easily generated or exposed to direct sunlight.

Do not bend or drop the card.

- The card may be damaged or the recorded content may be damaged or deleted.
- Put the card in the card case or the storage bag after use and when storing or carrying the card.
- Do not allow dirt, dust or water to get into the terminals on the back of the card and do not touch the terminals with your fingers.

■ When not using the camera for a long period of time

- Store the battery in a cool and dry place with a relatively stable temperature. [Recommended temperature: 15 °C to 25 °C (59 °F to 77 °F), Recommended humidity: 40% to 60%]
- Always remove the battery and the card from the camera.
- If the battery is left inserted in the camera, it will discharge even if the camera is turned off. If the battery continues to be left in the camera, it will discharge excessively and may become unusable even if charged.

- When storing the battery for a long period of time, we recommend charging it once a year. Remove the battery from the camera and store it again after it has completely discharged.
- We recommend storing the camera with a desiccant (silica gel) when you keep it in a closet or a cabinet.
- **Check all the parts before taking pictures when you have not used the camera for a long period of time.**

■ About the recorded data

- Recorded data may be damaged or lost if the camera breaks down due to inappropriate handling. Panasonic will not be liable for any damage suffered due to loss of recorded data.

■ About tripods

- When using a tripod, make sure it is stable when the camera is attached to it.
- You may not be able to remove the battery when using a tripod.
- Make sure that the screw on the tripod is not at an angle when attaching or detaching the camera. You may damage the screw on the camera if you use excessive force when turning it. Also, the camera body and the rating label may be damaged or scratched if the camera is attached too tightly to the tripod.
- Read the operating instructions for the tripod.

■ About the strap

- If you attach a heavy interchangeable lens (more than about 1 kg/35.3 oz) to the camera body, do not carry the camera by the strap. Hold the camera and the lens when carrying them.

Message Display

Confirmation messages or error messages will be displayed on the screen in some cases.

The major messages are described below as examples.

[THIS MEMORY CARD IS LOCKED]

The Write-Protect switch on the SD Memory Card or the SDHC Memory Card is slid to the [LOCK] side. Slide it to the other side to unlock it. (P23, 32, 114)

[NO VALID PICTURE TO PLAY]

Record a picture or insert a card with a recorded picture and then play it.

[THIS PICTURE IS PROTECTED]

Delete or overwrite the picture after canceling the protect setting. (P114)

[THIS PICTURE CANNOT BE DELETED] [SOME PICTURES CANNOT BE DELETED]

Pictures not based on the DCF standard cannot be deleted. If you want to delete some pictures, format the card after saving necessary data on a PC etc. (P32)

[NO ADDITIONAL DELETE SELECTIONS CAN BE MADE]

You have exceeded the number of pictures that can be set at once with [MULTI DELETE]. Delete the selected pictures and then select [MULTI DELETE] again to delete any remaining pictures. More than 999 favorites have been set.

[CANNOT BE SET ON THIS PICTURE]

If the pictures are not based on the DCF standard, the DPOF print cannot be set.

[MEMORY CARD ERROR FORMAT THIS CARD?]

The card format cannot be recognized by the camera. Format the card again with the camera after saving necessary data on a PC etc. (P32)

[MEMORY CARD PARAMETER ERROR]

Use a card compatible with this unit. (P6, 23)

- You can only use an SDHC Memory Card if using cards with 4 GB or more capacity.

[PLEASE TURN CAMERA OFF AND THEN ON AGAIN]

Check that the lens is attached correctly and then turn the camera off and on.

**[MEMORY CARD ERROR
PLEASE CHECK THE CARD]**

An error has occurred accessing the card. Insert the card again.

**[READ ERROR
PLEASE CHECK THE CARD]**

An error has occurred reading the data. Insert the card again. Make sure the card is inserted properly and then play back again.

**[WRITE ERROR
PLEASE CHECK THE CARD]**

An error has occurred writing the data. Turn the camera off and remove the card. Insert the card again and turn the camera on. Make sure the camera is turned off before removing or inserting the card to avoid damage.

[A FOLDER CANNOT BE CREATED]

A folder cannot be created because there are no remaining folder numbers that can be used. (P119)

Format the card after saving necessary data on a PC etc. (P32) If you execute [NO.RESET] in the [SETUP] menu after formatting, the folder number is reset to 100. (P29)

**[PICTURE IS DISPLAYED FOR 4:3 TV/
PICTURE IS DISPLAYED FOR 16:9 TV]**

- The video cable is connected to the camera. Press [MENU/SET] if you want to delete this message at once.
- Select [TV ASPECT] in the [SETUP] menu to change the TV aspect. (P31)

- This message also appears when the USB connection cable is connected to the camera only.
In this case, connect the other end of the USB connection cable to a PC or a printer. (P118, 120)

[CANCEL LIVE VIEW MODE]/[LIVE VIEW MODE CANNOT BE SELECTED]

If you use Live View where the temperature is high or for a long period of time, the temperature of the image sensor will increase and Live View may become unusable. Switch to using the Viewfinder for taking pictures or turn the camera off for a short while.

[PRINTER BUSY]/[PLEASE CHECK THE PRINTER]

The printer cannot print. Check the printer.

[THE LENS IS NOT ATTACHED PROPERLY.]

Is the lens correctly attached?
Detach the lens and then attach it again. (P15)

Troubleshooting

If you return the menu settings to the initial settings at the time of purchase, the condition may improve.

Select **[RESET]** in the **[SETUP]** menu. (P29)

■ Battery and power source

1: The camera cannot be operated even when it is turned on.

- Is the battery inserted correctly? Is the AC adaptor (P128) connected correctly?
- Is the battery sufficiently charged?
 - Charge the battery or use one that has been sufficiently charged.

2: The LCD monitor turns off while the camera is turned on.

The camera turns off arbitrarily.

- Is power save mode (P28) activated?
 - Press the shutter button halfway to cancel this mode.
- Is the battery exhausted?
 - Charge the battery or replace it with a battery which has enough capacity.

3: The camera turns off immediately after it is turned on.

- Is the battery charge insufficient to operate the camera?
 - Charge the battery or use one that has been sufficiently charged.
- If you leave the camera on, the battery will be exhausted. Turn the camera off frequently by using power save mode (P28) etc.



■ Recording

1: The picture cannot be recorded.

The shutter does not activate.

- Is the card inserted?
- Is there any memory remaining on the card?
 - Before recording, delete some pictures. (P49)
- Is the subject focused?
 - At the time of purchase, the camera is set so that you cannot take a picture until the subject is brought into focus. If you want to be able to take a picture when you press the shutter button fully even if the subject is not focused, set [FOCUS PRIORITY] in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu to [OFF]. (P106)

2: Contrast AF cannot be set.

- Are you using the supplied lens?
 - The camera automatically switches to phase difference AF [] (P59) if you use a lens that does not support contrast AF (P13) even if [LIVE VIEW AF] (P107) in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu is set to []. (P58).

3: The subject is not focused properly.

- Is the subject beyond the focus range of the camera? (P39)
- Have you taken a picture with jitter?
- Is [FOCUS PRIORITY] in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu set to [OFF]? (P106)
 - In this case, the picture may not be properly focused even if [AFS] or [AFC] in focus mode is set.

4: The recorded picture is whitish.

The lens is dirty.

- The picture can become whitish if there is dirt e.g. fingerprints on the lens. If the lens is dirty turn the camera off and then gently wipe the lens surface with a soft dry cloth.

5: The recorded picture is too bright or dark.

- Check that the exposure is correctly compensated. (P44)

6: The recorded picture is blurred. The optical image stabilizer is not effective.

- The shutter speed will become slower and the optical image stabilizer function may not work properly when taking pictures especially in dark places. In this case, we recommend holding the camera firmly with both hands when taking pictures (P35, 54). We recommend using a tripod and the self-timer (P74) when taking pictures with a slow shutter speed.

7: The recorded picture looks rough. Noise appears on the picture.

- Is the ISO sensitivity high or the shutter speed slow?
 - Decrease the ISO sensitivity. (P78)
 - Set [NOISE RED.] in [FILM MODE] towards [+] or set every item except [NOISE RED.] towards [–]. (P92)
 - Take pictures in bright places.
- Is [LONG SHTR NR] in the [REC] menu set to [OFF]? (P103)

8: The picture cannot be recorded with Live View.

- If you use Live View for a long period of time or where the temperature is high, the temperature of the image sensor will increase. A message may appear on the screen and Live View may become unusable. In this case, switch to using the viewfinder for taking pictures or turn the camera off for a short while.

9: A shutter sound is heard twice when taking pictures with Live View.

- If you press the shutter button fully, the shutter sound is heard twice and 1 picture is taken. The first shutter sound is heard when the shutter returns to the position before a picture is taken and the second shutter sound is heard when the picture is actually taken.

10: The shutter sound is heard once when taking pictures with Live View however a picture is not taken.

- The shutter sound is heard in auto focus when the mirror goes down and then goes up after pressing the shutter button halfway to enable the camera to focus or when the shutter button is released immediately after pressing it fully. However a picture is not taken.

■ LCD monitor**1: A flickering vertical line appears on the LCD monitor under fluorescent light.**

- The LCD monitor may flicker for a few seconds after turning the camera on indoors under fluorescent light. This is not a malfunction. This does not affect the pictures you are recording.

2: The LCD monitor is too bright or dark.

- Adjust the brightness of the LCD monitor. (P29)
- Is the camera in Power LCD mode? (P56)

3: Black, red, blue and green dots appear on the LCD monitor.

- These pixels do not affect the recorded pictures. This is not a malfunction. (P135)

4: Noise appears on the LCD monitor.

- In dark places, noise may appear to maintain the brightness of the LCD monitor. This does not affect the pictures you are recording.
-

■ Flash

1: The flash is not activated.

- Is the flash closed?
 - Slide the [⚡ OPEN] lever to open the flash. (P64)
- The flash is not activated when the [SCENERY] mode, [NIGHT SCENERY], [ILLUMINATIONS] or [CREATIVE NIGHT SCENERY] in [NIGHT PORTRAIT] mode, or [SUNSET] in scene mode are selected.

2: The flash is activated 2 times.

- The flash is activated 2 times. The interval between the first and second flash is longer when AUTO/Red-eye reduction [⚡ A], Forced ON/Red-eye reduction [⚡] or Slow sync./Red-eye reduction [⚡ S] is set so the subject should not move until the second flash is activated.

3: The flash is activated continuously.

- When the flash is activated it may be activated continuously. It is activated as an AF assist lamp when phase difference AF is set.

■ Playback

1: The picture being played back is not rotated, or is rotated in an unexpected direction, when displayed.

The camera has a function that automatically rotates the display of pictures recorded holding the camera vertically. (If you take pictures when aiming the camera up or down, the camera may recognize that it is being held vertically.)

- You can display the pictures without being rotated when [ROTATE DISP.] (P111) is set to [OFF].
- You can rotate pictures with the [ROTATE] function. (P111)

- You can only display the pictures rotated if you use a lens that supports the direction detection function (P13) and [ROTATE DISP.] is set to [ON].

2: The picture is not played back.

- Did you press [▶]?
- Is the card inserted?
- Is there a picture in the card?

3: The folder number and the file number are displayed as [-] and the screen turns black.

- Is the picture edited with a PC or recorded with a digital camera from another manufacturer?

This may happen if you remove the battery immediately after recording or you record with an exhausted battery.

 - Format the data to delete the pictures mentioned above. (P32) (Formatting irretrievably deletes all data including the other pictures. Check the data carefully before formatting.)
- Pictures edited or rotated with a PC may be displayed in black in playback mode (P48), multi playback (P52) and calendar playback (P53).

4: The picture is displayed with a date different from the actual recording date in calendar playback.

- Was the picture edited with a PC or recorded with a digital camera from another manufacturer?

This kind of picture may be displayed with a date different from the actual recording date in calendar playback. (P53)
- Is the clock in the camera set properly? (P24)

For example, if the clock setting on the camera is different from the date and time set on the PC and you acquire pictures recorded with the camera to the PC and then write them back to the card, the pictures may be displayed with dates different from the actual recording dates in calendar playback etc.

5: White round spots like soap bubbles appear on the recorded picture.

- If you take a picture with the flash in a dark place or indoors, white orbs may appear in the picture because the flash reflects off particles of dust in the air. This is not a malfunction.
- A characteristic of this is that the number of round spots and their position differ in every picture.



■ TV, PC and printer

1: The picture does not appear on the television.

- Is the camera connected to the TV correctly?
- Set the TV input to external input mode.

2: The display areas on the TV screen and the camera's LCD monitor are different.

Depending on the TV model, the area display may be smaller so the picture may be stretched horizontally or vertically and the top and bottom or left and right of the picture may be cut off when it is displayed. This is due to the TV specifications and is not a malfunction.

3: The picture cannot be transferred when the camera is connected to a PC.

- Is the camera connected to the PC correctly?
- Is the camera recognized by the PC correctly?
- Set [USB MODE] to [PC]. (P30, 118)

4: The card is not recognized by the PC.

- Disconnect the USB connection cable. Connect it again while the card is inserted in the camera.

5: The picture cannot be printed when the camera is connected to a printer.

- Does the printer support PictBridge?
 - You cannot print pictures with printers which do not support PictBridge. (P120)
- Set [USB MODE] to [PictBridge (PTP)]. (P30, 120)

6: The ends of the pictures are cut at printing.

- When using a printer with a trimming or borderless printing function, cancel this function before printing. (For details, refer to the operating instructions for the printer.)
- Depending on the photo printing store, you may be able to print pictures in 16:9 size if they were recorded when the aspect ratio setting (P94) was [16:9]. Check with the photo printing store before printing.

7: The picture is not displayed fully on the TV.

- Check the [TV ASPECT] setting on the camera. (P31)

■ Others

1: An unreadable language was selected by mistake.

- Press [MENU/SET], select the [SETUP] menu icon [P] and then select the [Q] icon to set the desired language. (P31)

2: A sound is heard when the camera is turned on or off.









This is the sound of lens or aperture movement and is not a malfunction.









- 3: A certain part of the picture appears blinking in black and white.**
- Is [HIGHLIGHT] set to [ON]?
 - This appears due to the highlight feature function which shows white saturated areas. (P30)
- 4: The AF assist lamp does not turn on.**
- Check the [AF ASSIST LAMP] setting in the [CUSTOM MENU] menu. (P106)
 - Are you taking pictures in dark places?
 - The AF assist lamp does not turn on in bright places.
- 5: The camera becomes warm.**
- The surface of the camera and the reverse side of the LCD monitor may become warm during use. This does not affect the performance or quality of the camera.
- 6: The clock is reset.**
- If you do not use the camera for a long time, the clock may be reset. When the message [PLEASE SET THE CLOCK] appears, set the clock again. (P24)
 - When you take a picture before setting the clock, [0:00 0. 0. 0] is recorded.
- 7: Colors appear on the picture which were not found in the actual scene.**
- Depending on the zoom magnification, the picture may have some colored fringes around the subject. This is called chromatic aberration and may be more visible when recording distant subjects. However this is not a malfunction.
- 8: The file numbers are not recorded consecutively.**
- When you perform an operation after taking a certain action, the pictures may be recorded in folders with different numbers from the ones used prior to the operation. (P119)

- 9: The file numbers are recorded in ascending order.**
- If the battery is inserted or removed when the camera is not turned off, the recorded folder numbers are lost. However if you turn the camera on again and record pictures, the recorded folder numbers are different from the prior recorded folder numbers.
